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FAFSA Changes for 2017-18

On Sept. 14, 2015, President Obama will announce significant changes to the *Free Application for Federal Student Aid* (FAFSA[®]) process that will impact millions of students. We want to inform you—our partners in the college access, planning, and funding process—about these changes and provide you with tools and information you can use.

Changes for the 2017-18 FAFSA®

- The 2016-17 FAFSA[®] will be the final FAFSA to launch on January 1. Beginning with the 2017-18 application, the FAFSA will be available to students and families October 1 of the previous year. This means students who need to complete the 2017-18 FAFSA will be able to access and submit the form anytime from Oct. 1, 2016, through June 30, 2018.
- 2. In addition to changing the launch date for the application cycle, beginning with the 2017–18 FAFSA, we also will change the requirements for reporting income information. Currently, FAFSA applicants are required to provide income information from the "prior year." For example, 2016–17 applicants must report 2015 income information. Beginning with the 2017–18 FAFSA, applicants will be required to provide "prior-prior" year income information. This means that the 2017–18 FAFSA will collect 2015 income information.

The following table provides a summary of key dates as we transition to using the early FAFSA submission timeframe and earlier tax information.

They first find out what the needs of a facility or organization are for computer services. Then they make a detailed plan, purchase the equipment, and install it. They also make sure that the system continues to work properly and meet the needs of the organization.

Health, Safety, and Environmental Assurance People who work in this group of occupations are focused on making our environment safe. They apply methods to making contaminated land safe and productive. They make and enforce rules in work places to that the health and physical wei-being of workers will be assured. Some design office equipment that will cause the least amount of wear and item on the human body.

Quality Assuming People who work in this group of occupations have the responsibility of making sure that whistever a company delivers is of good quality. Some choose the materials that are used to make the groduct to assure that they meet the highest standard. Others test the groduct after production to make sure that it tooks and operates correctly. Some constantly test product against legal requirements to make sure that they conform.

Web and Digital Communications. People who work in this group of occupations communicate to others via the Web, DVDs, and other digital means. Some design the appearance of Web sites and digital groducts. Others program the graphics, videos, images, and audio that is included in those sites and products. Still others write the programs to bring all the pieces together into a product.

Health Informatics People who work in this group of occupations manage health-related information and facilities. The group includes those who manage hospitals, health centers, nursing homes, and other medical care facilities. It also includes those who collect information about clients, record it, and make it available to those who need to know it.

Do an Educational Plan?

Individual Student Plan

- Ensures that grades 8-12 Counselor guides students in the development and annual revision of high school four-year educational plan
- Requires students to maintain an educational/career planning portfolio of study based on legislative and other graduation requirements
- 4-year educational plan shall be approved in writing by the parents or guardians and become part of the educational/career planning portfolio.

Alabama's 2020 Learners

- All students perform at or above proficiency and show continuous improvement
- > All students succeed (gap closure).
- Every student graduates from high school (grad rate).
- Every student graduates high school prepared (college and career readiness).

Plan 2020: A Prepared Graduate

- Possesses the knowledge and skills needed to enroll and succeed in credit bearing, first-year courses at a two or four-year college, trade school, technical school, without the need for remediation.
- Possesses the ability to apply core academic skills to realworld situations through collaboration with peers in problem solving, precision, and punctuality in delivery of an product, and has a desire to be a life-long learner.



Should an Educational Plan be created?

2020 Support Systems

- All students attend school daily and be engaged in rigorous and relevant learning environments.
- All students develop a sense of personal and civic responsibility to ensure a learning environment that is safe and civil.
- All students will be provided with individual and group counseling services.
- All students will enter 9th grade prepared with a 4-year plan that addresses their individual academic and career interest needs
- All students will be prepared with healthy meal, physical education, and health instruction support with needed medical and related services.

Individual Student Planning

 The individual planning component consists of school counselors coordination ongoing systematic activities designed to assist the individual student in establishing personal goals and developing future plans.

New Educational Plan Format

- Is electronic.
- Is available 24/7 to student, parents and school personnel.
- Requires "approval" to be complete.
- Reflects the courses that a student will have access to through their high school, ACCESS, Dual Enrollment, a CTE Center and Articulation.
- Reflects the student's postsecondary options.
