American Rescue Plan Elementary and Secondary School Emergency

Relief (ARP ESSER)

The Alabama State Department of Education (ALSDE) has received its allocation from the American Rescue Plan Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ARP ESSER) fund to support the efforts of local education agencies (LEAs) to address the impact of the pandemic on Alabama's students.

ARP ESSER funds were awarded to Alabama in the same proportion as the state received under Title I, Part A, of the *Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965* as amended in Fiscal Year 2020. The total amount allocated to Alabama for the ARP ESSER funds is \$2,020,070,466—90% of which will be awarded to LEAs.

Under the ARP ESSER, LEAs must reserve at least 20 percent of funds to address learning loss through the implementation of evidence-based interventions and ensure those interventions respond to students' social, emotional, and academic needs and address the disproportionate impact of COVID-19 on underrepresented student subgroups. The allowable interventions for the 20% reservation include summer learning and enrichment programs, extended-day or extended-year programs, and after-school programs. The remaining funds can be used for a wide range of activities to address the needs of LEAs arising from the pandemic similar to ESSER I and ESSER II.

The application process for the ARP ESSER funds will take place through a simplified three-step process allowing LEAs to have expedited access to the funds as follows:

**STEP 1:** The Superintendent for each LEA must sign the attached assurances document and email it to <u>ARPapps@alsde.edu</u>.

**STEP 2:** Each LEA will develop an In-Person Instruction Plan or modify the previously developed Reopening Plan, as outlined in the ARP ESSER Relief Plan, and have the plan available on the LEA's website.

**STEP 3:** Each LEA must complete the ARP ESSER electronic Grant Application Process (eGAP) application providing the ALSDE with a description, timeline, and budget for all expenditures.

More specific LEA requirements are forthcoming as we receive final guidance from the United States Department of Education. Additional supports will be provided to LEAs including office hours and technical assistance. This information will be covered in the superintendents' webinar scheduled for May 25, 2021, as well as the May 26, 2021, webinar for other central office support staff.
