RE: American Rescue Plan Act (ARP) of 2021, Individuals with Disabilities

Education Act (IDEA) Part B, ARP IDEA) Allocations

As a provision of Section 2014 (a) of the *American Rescue Plan Act of 2021* (ARP), for Elementary and Secondary emergency relief funding plans passed by the United States Congress in response to the 2019 Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19), the Alabama State Department of Education (ALSDE) has received its allocations for additional supplemental federal funding under the *Individuals with Disabilities Education Act* (IDEA), to support the efforts of local education agencies (LEAs) address the impact of the pandemic on Alabama's students with disabilities.

The ARP IDEA funds were awarded to Alabama in the same proportion as the state received under IDEA, Part B. The LEA allocations were also figured using the same methodology as the regular IDEA Part B, and Preschool funds. However, the ARP IDEA funds were allocated according to the LEAs population and poverty of the allocation formula because the base amount was already allocated under the regular FY 2022 IDEA, Part B, award. In total, the ALSDE received the following additional allocated amounts in ARP IDEA funding:

ARP IDEA Part B, Section 611	\$37,843,102	CFDA #84.027X
ARP IDEA Part B Preschool, Section 619	\$3,020,795	CFDA #84.173X

The IDEA funds awarded under the ARP are provided as additional supplemental grant funding to the Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2021 IDEA funds, and the state (FY) 2022 allocations. The funds are intended for use to support direct and related services under the IDEA. All ARP IDEA funds must be used consistently with the current IDEA, Part B, and Preschool, statutory and regulatory requirements. Hence, all the same federal requirements and guidelines for the use of Part B, Section 611 and Sections 619 funds under the IDEA, EDGAR, and Uniform Grant Guidance (UGG) apply to ARP funds. This includes but is not limited to requirements for Maintenance of Effort (MOE), indirect costs allowable at the restricted rate and the calculations and set aside funds for Private School Proportionate Share

and Comprehensive Coordinated Early Intervening Services (CCEIS). The LEAs must be able to account for and track the use of IDEA funds and ARP funds separately. All ARP IDEA funds must be expended by September 30, 2023.

The application process and budget software to access these funds is included as part of the consolidated electronic Grant Application Process (eGAP). The ARP IDEA budget applications for the allocated Part B, and Preschool funds must be submitted in eGAP by September 24, 2021.

The ARP IDEA Supplemental Grant Allocations Information

The ARP Act Overview

The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARP), Public Law 117-2 was signed into law on March 11, 2021. The ARP is one of three Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund (ESSER Fund) plans passed by the United States Congress in response to the 2019 Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19), that were earmarked as supplemental federal funds for Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2021 funds.

Purpose

The ARP IDEA funds received are for local education agencies (LEAs) and are provided as additional supplemental grant funding, intended to support early intervention and special education services for infants, toddlers, children, and youth with disabilities and their families.

Alabama Allocations

Section 2014(a) of the ARP issued **supplemental federal funding** for direct and related services under the IDEA. The Alabama State Department of Education (ALSDE) received the following additional supplemental funding for Alabama FY 2022 IDEA formula grants:

- ARP IDEA, Part B, Section 611- \$37,843,102
- ARP IDEA, Preschool, Section 619- \$ 3,020,795

Distribution of Funds

Local educational agencies (LEAs) that receive regular Part B funds will receive these additional ARP IDEA funds. The LEA allocations were figured using the same methodology as the regular IDEA, Part B, and Preschool funds. However, the IDEA ARP funds were allocated according to the LEAs population and poverty portion of the allocation formula because the base amount was already allocated under the regular FY 2022 IDEA award.

The LEAs can access ARP IDEA funds for Part B (611) and Preschool (619) through the electronic Grants Application Process (eGAP) portal. The LEAs will submit separate budget applications for the ARP and regular IDEA grants allocation in eGAP but parallel budgets that have the same reporting and accountability requirements for both ARP and traditional allocations. The IDEA ARP allocations for Part B and Preschool are currently loaded in eGAP and the budget applications for these funds are **due in eGAP by September 30, 2021.**

Guidelines and Requirements

All the same federal requirements and guidelines for the use of IDEA funds under the IDEA, Education Department General Administrative Regulations (EDGAR), and Uniform Grant Guidance (UGG) apply to ARP funds. This includes but is not limited to requirements for Maintenance of Effort (MOE), indirect costs allowable at the restricted rate and the set-aside funds for Private School Proportionate Share and Comprehensive Coordinated Early Intervening Services (CCEIS).

The MOE requirements have not been waived and no exceptions are currently available for ARP IDEA funds. The LEAs must maintain and not supplant their state and local expenditures with these funds. However, ARP funds may aid in allowing an adjustment regarding the 50 percent rule (34 CFR 300.205), if an LEA state-issued determination is "Meets Requirements" and the LEA is not in Comprehensive Coordinated Early Intervening Services (CCEIS). The LEAs that do not meet state determination requirements are not eligible to qualify for the 50 percent rule.

Grant Codes

The ARP IDEA Fund and Revenue Codes:

- ARP IDEA, Part B, (611)-Fund Source 4286
- ARP IDEA, Preschool (619)-Fund Source 4287

Use of Funds-Period of Performance

All ARP Act IDEA funds must be expended by September 30, 2023.

Auditing and Monitoring ARP Funds

The ALSDE will monitor ARP IDEA budgets and expenditures in the same manner as traditional federal and state special education funds. ARP funds are also subjected to the Single Audit review.

Funding Expenditure Considerations:

Funds may be used for all allowable purposes under Part B of the IDEA and are subject to all requirements and provisions that apply to IDEA funds, including requirements and provisions under IDEA, EDGAR, and the OMB Uniform Guidance. The following list includes, but is not limited to, the following recommended considerations regarding funding:

- Sustainability.
- Challenges from the pandemic (e.g., disruption in education for students with disabilities).
- Mental health impact on special education services.
- Issue of equity in special education and preschool services.
- Alleviating evaluation backlogs.
- Providing necessary compensatory and/or Extended School Year (ESY) services as determined based on IEP team decisions.
- Providing support and direct services for students with disabilities.
- Supporting assistive technology and assistive technology devices in the classroom.
- Supporting the capacity building activities and/or the delivery of services by the LEA to improve outcomes and results for students with disabilities.
- Implementing and or supporting transition programs.
- Providing and/or supporting positive behavior supports to improve outcomes and results for students with disabilities.
