How does the LEA plan to use funds to implement prevention and mitigation strategies in order to continuously and safely operate schools for in-person learning?

Enterprise City Schools response to the Covid-19 pandemic has been and continues to be based upon the most up-to-date guidance from state and local health officials as well as the CDC and APHD. At the heart of our response has been our students' academic, social, emotional, and mental health needs. Our ultimate goal has been to conduct school/class in-person teaching and learning as quickly and as safely as possible.

ECS plans to open the 2021-22 school year with five days per week of in-person instruction at all school sites. ECS has organized our response to the impacts of COVID-19 on our community's students according to the following three phases:

- 1. Relief: Give schools urgent resources so that they can provide effective instruction and supports at scale during the pandemic.
- 2. Recovery: Provide extra investments to help students and schools respond to the needs created by the prolonged crisis as we return to in-school operations.
- 3. Rebuilding: Redesign the system to focus on nurturing the whole child, balancing cognitive with sociolemotional skill development and ensuring that all children have access to the conditions and resources that enhance learning and development.

In tandem with other funding sources, ARP funding will be a critical component of supporting these response and recovery efforts.

How will the LEA ensure that the evidence-based interventions will address the academic impact of lost instructional time and ensure that those interventions respond to the academic, social, emotional, and mental health needs of all students including underrepresented student subgroups (each major racial and ethnic group, children from low-income families, children with disabilities, English Learners, gender, migrant students, students experiencing homelessness, and children and youth in foster care) and those who are particularly impacted disproportionately by the COVID-19 pandemic?

- ECS will provide traditional remedial summer school opportunities during the summers of 2022-2024
- ECS will provide additional summer academic recovery and enrichment opportunities through content-specific CARE Camps (Comprehensive Academic Reinforcement and Experiences) in the areas of Reading, Mathematics, Science, Social Studies and Writing, and Social Emotional Learning.
- ECS will provide additional Academic Recovery Support personnel for students with special needs during the 2021-2022, 2022-2023 and 2023-2024 school years
- ECS will provide extensive professional development to teachers in the areas of Assessment and Grading, Differentiation, and Student Engagement, coaching and mentoring to impact teacher quality and enhanced student learning

- ECS will provide online access to high-quality content, instructional tools, professional learning, engaging media and comprehensive diagnostic and progress-monitoring assessments through the use of iStation, iReady, Discovery Education
- ECS will continue Community Liaisons and Resources to support students and families with academic needs to develop effective family partnerships during the 2022-2023 and 2023-2024 school years (2021-2022 school year funded by ESSER II Set-Aside Fund addressing Unfinished Learning)
- ECS will continue partnership with ThriveWay/PeerHelpers and Coffee County Mental Health Services for social/emotional/behavioral/mental health supports for students
- ECS will provide additional training to staff in critical areas through coursework provided by Math Recovery, LETRS, and SPIRE, iStation, iReady, APlus, Course of Study, BIG Ideas, Course Alignment and Common Assessments.

• Our district will use ESSER grant funds toward our social worker efforts to support our low-income families/special needs/ESL population. Time is allocated for her to work with these families to ensure communication between home and school with constant conversations through web-based visits,, phone calls, emails etc. addressing safety issues, supporting living conditions, attendance, interpreters, meeting IEP requirements, etc. We will ensure that no student or teacher will be denied participation based on gender, race, national origin, color, disability or age.

ARP ESSER funds will be used to host a Summer Enrichment Camp during the Summer of 2021, 2022, and 2023.

Enterprise City Schools' Summer Experiences provide opportunities for students to get assistance with content outside of the regular school day. This includes programming at all grade levels and the content areas available vary by site and time of year. The Elementary and Middle School Summer Experiences provide additional time and a strategic focus on learning for students who cannot achieve their academic goals in reading and mathematics during the regular academic year. The targeted students are those who are not meeting grade level expectations on formative and summative assessments in reading and/or math. This free programming aims to strengthen reading and math skills through small class sizes and data-driven instructional focus.

There are a variety of program options for elementary and middle school students the entire month of June. In-field certified teachers will work with students. Snacks and limited transportation (selected stops) will be provided.

The High School Extended Day provides selected classes for high school students who are seeking to make up failed courses and/or earn additional high school credits during the summer. These courses are based on the school's demand for a particular content area, are taught by an in-field certified instructor. Programming typically begins immediately after the school day, and lasts for 2 ½ hours per evening (2-3 times per week) for a duration of 9 or 13 weeks, depending on the semester. Every student has an opportunity to attend.

Enterprise City Schools have the desire for and encourage high expectations of both teachers and students. Reform strategies will be expanded to increase expertise to effect the needed changes that will allow us to utilize cross-program coordination, program integration, and student improvement in achieving high academic standards. In response to the results of the Comprehensive Needs Assessment, the following goals have been identified and agreed upon by faculty, staff and parent community members of each school-wide project. Specific instructional programs and strategies are located in each school's ACIP. Student assessment data will be reviewed to identify any gaps in student achievement among low income and minority students. These may include:

- Accelerated Math/Accelerated Reader
- AMSTI
- STAR
- Compass
- SPIRE
- Edmentum
- Do the Math
- Envision
- Other Assessments

Parent conferences and notification for identified students will be held to discuss identified strategies to use at home and to provide support at school. Students that are identified as experiencing severe behavioral problems may be referred to the Problem Solving Team (PST) or RTI for the team to consider if the student needs to be referred to other agencies such as the Family Services Center or Department of Human Resources (DHR), etc.

ECS system coordinators/administrators will also continue to work closely with the schools to ensure cross program coordination and to address system-wide needs of ALL students (migratory, limited English proficient, students with disabilities, homeless, neglected/delinquent, foster care administrators, and economically disadvantaged) to meet state proficient and advanced levels of student academic achievement on state content standards. Although most needs, goals, and activities are planned for both teachers and students at the local schools, others are addressed system-wide.

ECS through our commitments and with the help of the committees, ensure that measures will be taken to provide equitable participation for all students, personnel and programs meeting state requirements. Furthermore, all students will have an opportunity to achieve high academic standards.

ECS will identify students who may be at risk for academic failure, universal screeners through DIBELS Next, iStation screenings, STAR and ACAP Summative Assessment are used in grades 2-8. STAR will be used to monitor student progress in grades 1 and 2. Moreover, state assessment data is reviewed before the beginning of each school year to further identify students in need. The reports in iNOW also show students who have risk factors such as low attendance, poor grades, and excessive discipline referrals. These reports are used in our PST and Building Leadership Team meetings to develop plans for at Risk students. PST teams will review data of all 2020-2021 virtual students. ECS will also review and include the following other progress monitoring tools include the following:

- 1. Annual Retention Rate
 - 1. RTI Lists
 - 2. Average Daily Attendance
 - 3. SIR Reports
 - 4. System Average Current Expenditures per child in ADA
 - 5. System Free/Reduced meal eligibility
 - 6. Stakeholder Surveys

 - 9. At Risk reports (INOW)

ECS will use information obtained from the state assessments, ACAP, DIBELS, ACCESS, and additional local assessments (STAR) to assist in diagnosing and teaching.

A plan of action will be formulated for each student failing to meet proficient or advanced levels of academic achievement. Results of all assessments are analyzed annually for comparability.

We will also purchase ELA & Math manipulatives to help improve student achievement. Additionally, we will purchase an online subscription to XYZ Company for the duration of the summer program to assist our participating EL students with the curriculum (See attached job description). Enterprise City Schools' Summer Experiences provide opportunities for students to get assistance with content outside of the regular school day. This includes programming at all grade levels and the content areas available vary by site and time of year. The Elementary and Middle School Summer Experiences provide additional time and a strategic focus on learning for students who cannot achieve their academic goals in reading and mathematics during the regular academic year. The targeted students are those who are not meeting grade level expectations on formative and summative assessments in reading and/or math. This free programming aims to strengthen reading and math skills through small class sizes and data-driven instructional focus.

 - The High School Extended Day provides selected classes for high school students who are seeking to make up failed courses and/or earn additional high school credits during the summer. These courses are based on the school's demand for a particular content area, are taught by an in-field certified instructor. Programming typically begins immediately after the school day, and lasts for 2 ½ hours per evening (2-3 times per week) for a duration of 9 or 13 weeks, depending on the semester. Every student has an opportunity to attend.
- Elementary and secondary classes are to be focused on individual and group instruction. Structured programs (Edmentum, SPIRE, etc.) should provide a learning path for students. The completion on classwork and homework should be given minimal time toward the end of the session. Extended Day teachers are to be actively engaged with students during each session.

Secondary schools will offer an after school academic comprehensive and reinforcement experiences programs. Classes will be offered twice a week from 3:05-4:30.
