PROGRAMMATIC, FISCAL, AND REPORTING ASSURANCES

The United States Department of Education (USED) has approved the application from the State of Alabama for ESSER funds under the CARES Act. The availability of funds is from 4/29/2020 to 4/29/2021. The LEA will use ESSER funds for activities allowable under section 18003(d) of Division B of the CARES Act. How will the LEA determine the most important educational needs as a result of COVID-19?

The Franklin County school system will determine the most important educational needs as a result of Covid-19 based on supplies needed to help prevent and sanitize facilities, feed the children, and resources needed to close the educational gap due to school closures. This needs assessment included input from key administrative personnel such as school principals, CNP director, Transportation Director, and Maintenance Director. It was determined that additional computer hardware such as Chromebooks would be purchased for the students to check out during remote learning, software programs for student use, additional Janitorial supplies for sanitizing of facilities, as well as maintenance needs to enhance and promote social distancing in classrooms and common student areas (cafeteria, break areas, gyms).

How does the LEA intend to assess and address student learning gaps resulting from the disruption in educational services?

The Franklin County school system will assess student performance upon the return to school with programs purchased with ESSER funds. Examples include Reading Horizons and Imagine Math and Reading. Additional services that will be utilized to close the achievement gap due to school closures will be small group instruction, tutoring programs, and on-line remediation.

Services to students are ongoing and will continue in the event of school closures. All funds will be expended or encumbered by 9/30/2022.

The Franklin County School System will use ESSER funds to provide one to one devices, hot spots, and software to students where applicable. The school system will also use the ESSER funds to maintain staff, provide additional staff to monitor, create, and implement virtual learning opportunities for students.

- (6) that any application, evaluation, periodic program plan or report relating to each program will be made readily available to parents and other members of the general public;
 - (7) that in the case of any project involving construction -
 - (A) the project is not inconsistent with overall State plans for the construction of school facilities, and (B) in developing plans for construction, due consideration will be given to excellence of architecture and design and to compliance with standards prescribed by the Secretary under section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 in order to ensure that facilities constructed with the use of Federal funds are accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities;
- (8) that the local educational agency has adopted effective procedures for acquiring and disseminating to teachers and administrators participating in each program significant information from educational research, demonstrations, and similar projects, and for adopting, where appropriate, promising educational practices developed through such projects; and
- (9) that none of the funds expended under any applicable program will be used to acquire equipment (including computer software) in any instance in which such acquisition results in a direct financial benefit to any organization representing the interests of the purchasing entity or its employees or any affiliate of such an organization.
