PROGRAMMATIC, FISCAL, AND REPORTING ASSURANCES

The United States Department of Education (USED) has approved the application from the State of Alabama for ESSER funds under the CARES Act. The availability of funds is from 4/29/2020 to 4/29/2021. LEAs will be allowed to expend funds until 9/30/2022. Pre-award costs to the ESSER fund will be allowed for allowable cost incurred on or after March 13, 2020.

2. Allowable Service(s) Assurance

The LEA Superintendent or his/her authorized representative assures or certifies that:

The LEA will use ESSER funds for activities allowable under section 18003(d) of Division B of the CARES Act. The United States Department of Education does not consider the following to be an allowable use of ESSER funds, under any part of 18003: 1) subsidizing or offsetting executive salaries and benefits of individuals who are not employees of the SEA or LEAs or 2) expenditures related to state or local teacher or faculty unions or associations.

How will the LEA determine the most important educational needs as a result of COVID-19?

Lemar County central office staff (Superintendent, curriculum supervisors, CSFO, CNP Director, Lend District Nurse, Special Education Director, Transportation Supervisor, Technology staff) along with school administrators held a series of meetings to determine a system needs assessment. When school was abruptly shut down in the traditional sense, we quickly learned what our most immediate technological needs were concerning virtual delivery. Once we set down during meetings, we were able to discuse concerns, issues and needs to be prepared going forward as a result of COVID-19. Collaborative planning with stakeholders has made our needs assessment clearer and more precise. The decision was made into might need on virtual energial to excuse our heads assessment clearer and more precise. The decision was made into might need our budget needed to be focused were technology that would be instrumental in virtual learning (smart boards, Chromebocks, laptops); hire a special education teacher to focus on those students who are enrolled in virtual learning who also have an IEP to ensure they are getting the help they need; fund a full time nurse above what our state funding supplies; pay for INow hosting for Schoology integration; purchases licenses so our teachers have the capability to racord lessons and store them in their virtual classrooms; budget for overtime due to the text workload due to COVID and training time; janitorial supplies for all campuses to ensure sonitized schools; POS matchines in each functions that have scanners for a touch free funch period; and funding which can be easily sentitized in high trailic areas.

How does the LEA intend to assess and address student learning gaps resulting from the disruption in educational services?

Once school resumes, our plan is to use Scanlron Performance Series to assess our students. We plan to use our RTI period to remediate and intervene to address student learning gaps as revealed by the Scantron results. In addition, the district will use Almswab Plus to assess students in grades K-3 in math and reading. The district has also purchased an intervention program for reading to be used in grades Pre-K-5 to address student needs. The district purchased the Sonday System as an intervention program. The program and provide multisensory reading instruction to students while incorporating the essential components of reading (phonemic awareness, thereby, vocabulary, comprehension). The program also integrates a systematic spelling component. The strategies used within the program are consistent with those recommended by the National Reading Panel (2000). Based on proven Orton-Gillingham nethods, this program is a direct, explicit, multisensory, structured, sequential, diagnostic, and prescriptive way to teach literacy that is simple, quick, easy to implement and highly effective.

What is the LEA's proposed timeline for providing services and assistance to students and staff?

We have already begun the process of providing services and assistance for our students and staff. Materials and supplies have been ordered, plans put into place and on-going collaboration and communication with stakeholders. May 2020 and ending by September 30, 2022.

How will the LEA use ESSER funds to promote remote learning?

We have surveyed our parents on their technological needs, i.e. devices, internet service, wifi, etc. Our plan during another school closure is to provide a device for every student that doesn't have access to one. We have also set up remote hotspots in our school parking lots to provide wifi for those who have poor or no internet service. We have also been working to get information out to families who are eligible for free internet through ADECA.

3. Equitable Services Assurances

- (5) that the local educational agency will provide reasonable opportunities for the participation by teachers, parents, and other interested agencies, organizations, and individuals in the planning for and operation of each program;
- (6) that any application, evaluation, periodic program plan or report relating to each program will be made readily available to parents and other members of the general public;
 - (7) that in the case of any project involving construction -
 - (A) the project is not inconsistent with overall State plans for the construction of school facilities, and
 - (B) in developing plans for construction, due consideration will be given to excellence of architecture and design and to compliance with standards prescribed by the Secretary under section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 in order to ensure that facilities constructed with the use of Federal funds are accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities;
- (8) that the local educational agency has adopted effective procedures for acquiring and disseminating to teachers and administrators participating in each program significant information from educational research, demonstrations, and similar projects, and for adopting, where appropriate, promising educational practices developed through such projects; and
- (9) that none of the funds expended under any applicable program will be used to acquire equipment (including computer software) in any instance in which such acquisition results in a direct financial benefit to any organization representing the interests of the purchasing entity or its employees or any affiliate of such an organization.
- (c) A general application submitted under this section shall remain in effect for the duration of the program it covers. The State agencies or boards administering the programs covered by the application shall not require the submission or amendment of such application unless required by changes in Federal or State law or by other significant change in the circumstances affecting an assurance in such application.

6. Section 427 of the General Education Provisions Act Assurances

What steps does the LEA propose to take to permit students, teachers, and other program beneficiaries to overcome barriers (including barriers based on gender, race, color, national origin, disability, and age) that impede equal access to, or participation in, the program?

All students PreK through 5th grade in need of reading intervention will be afforded the same opportunity with the offering of Sonday System, which will include after school and summer tutoring. Policy 6.9 of the Lamar County Board of Education Policy Manual will be strictly adhered to. It states that "No student will be unlawfully excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or subjected to discrimination in any program or activity offered or sponsored by the Board on the basis of race, ethnicity, color, disability, creed, national origin, sex, immigrant or migrant status, non-English speaking ability, or homeless status. Any barriers that arise during the course of the program will be addressed on a case by case basis and dealt with swiftly.
