PROGRAMMATIC, FISCAL, AND REPORTING ASSURANCES

The United States Department of Education (USED) has approved the application from the State of Alabama for ESSER funds under the CARES Act. The availability of funds is from 4/29/2020 to 4/29/2021. LEAs will be allowed to expend funds until 9/30/2022. Pre-award costs to the ESSER fund will be allowed for allowable cost incurred on or after March 13, 2020.

2. Allowable Service(s) Assurance

The LEA Superintendent or his/her authorized representative assures or certifies that:

The LEA will use ESSER funds for activities allowable under section 18003(d) of Division B of the CARES Act. How will the LEA determine the most important educational needs as a result of COVID-19?

Marion County Schools Supervisors starting meeting in early June to determine the needs of our system. Some of our needs were determined by what was going to be required for the upcoming school year to keep our students and employees safe and healthy. Other needs were determined by what we had just experienced as we had to close schools and continue to educate our students. The closure made us realize that we have many students that do not have the ability to connect digitally and, those that do, do not always have a device to work on at home.

How does the LEA intend to assess and address student learning gaps resulting from the disruption in educational services?

We chose the STAR Assessment by Renaissance for our K-3 Literacy Assessment. In order to maintain continuity throughout the system, we chose to use the STAR Assessment to assess all students in grades K-12 to identify learning gaps. We already offer thousands of digital books through MyOn and have purchased Freckles for our individual learning plans. It is our belief that these Renaissance products will identify learning gaps and then give us the educational services to fill those gaps based on individual student need. We have had 63 elementary teachers to participate in an Orton Gillingham on-line training program this summer that we are paying for with CARES funds. These teachers will use the methodology they learned to help students learn to read proficiently on grade level.

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What is the LEA's proposed timeline for providing services and assistance to students and staff?

All services and assistance will begin on July 6, 2020 when we begin our First Grade Summer Reading Camp. Services for all students will be in place when school starts on August 11, 2020. We will continue to operate under these new conditions throughout the 2020-2021 school year and until the global pandemic subsides. The Renaissance products will continue to be used to identify and address learning gaps for several years. All funds will be expended by September 30, 2022.

How will the LEA use ESSER funds to promote remote learning?

Go Guardian is being purchased to help us filter our Chromebooks that will be checked out to students enrolled in the Marion County Virtual Academy or those students enrolled in traditional school who are temporarily participating in remote learning through our blended option. We are purchasing and installing hotspots at all of our schools so parents can sit in the school parking lot and access WiFi. Chromebooks are being bought for teachers so they can easily manage the virtual curriculum and the LMS if they have to be quarantined at home.

Our Federal Programs Director met with the only private school that had chosen to participate. Over the course of the summer, the school decided to close and only offer a home school cover.

(5) that the local educational agency will provide reasonable opportunities for the participation by teachers, parents, and other interested agencies, organizations, and individuals in the planning for and operation of each program;

(6) that any application, evaluation, periodic program plan or report relating to each program will be made readily available to parents and other members of the general public;

(7) that in the case of any project involving construction -

(A) the project is not inconsistent with overall State plans for the construction of school facilities, and
 (B) in developing plans for construction, due consideration will be given to excellence of architecture and design and to compliance with standards prescribed by the Secretary under section 504 of the
 Rehabilitation Act of 1973 in order to ensure that facilities constructed with the use of Federal funds are accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities;

(8) that the local educational agency has adopted effective procedures for acquiring and disseminating to teachers and administrators participating in each program significant information from educational research, demonstrations, and similar projects, and for adopting, where appropriate, promising educational practices developed through such projects; and

(9) that none of the funds expended under any applicable program will be used to acquire equipment (including computer software) in any instance in which such acquisition results in a direct financial benefit to any organization representing the interests of the purchasing entity or its employees or any affiliate of such an organization.
(c) A general application submitted under this section shall remain in effect for the duration of the program it covers. The State agencies or boards administering the programs covered by the application shall not require the submission or amendment of such application unless required by changes in Federal or State law or by other significant change in the circumstances affecting an assurance in such application.

6. Section 427 of the General Education Provisions Act Assurances

(a) The purpose of this section is to assist the Department in implementing the Department's mission to ensure equal access to education and to promote educational excellence throughout the Nation, by -

What steps does the LEA propose to take to permit students, teachers, and other program beneficiaries to overcome barriers (including barriers based on gender, race, color, national origin, disability, and age) that impede equal access to, or participation in, the program?

We will provide Chromebooks, WiFi access where possible, and a virtual curriculum to students who choose not to come back to traditional school this year. Teachers will be given a Chromebook to work on both at school and at home. We are employing a Virtual/Remote Learning Specialist to work with teachers and students to coordinate our virtual program and to make the transition from traditional to blended as seamless as possible. If any barriers arise Marion County Schools will work quickly to resolve them.
