PROGRAMMATIC, FISCAL, AND REPORTING ASSURANCES

The United States Department of Education (USED) has approved the application from the State of Alabama for ESSER funds under the CARES Act. The availability of funds is from 4/29/2020 to 4/29/2021. LEAs will be allowed to expend funds until 9/30/2022. Pre-award costs to the ESSER fund will be allowed for allowable cost incurred on or after March 13, 2020.

2. Allowable Service(s) Assurance

The LEA Superintendent or his/her authorized representative assures or certifies that:

The LEA will use ESSER funds for activities allowable under section 18003(d) of Division B of the CARES Act. How will the LEA determine the most important educational needs as a result of COVID-19?

The St. Clair County school system will use surveys of all employee groups, and, to the extent possible, students and parents, as the basis of the needs assessment pertinent to system needs as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. Survey results will be gathered, tabulated, and reviewed to determine the most relevant needs. Following the collection of data, meetings will be held to gain feedback/ideas about how to address the most prevalent needs. To the extent possible, all stakeholder groups will be included in these meetings. Monies from this application will be used to address the most prevalent needs of the school system, which are: the purchase of sanitation supplies and equipment; the purchase of software programs to help implement, facilitate and/or support on-line/remote learning; technological devices to enable student participation in on-line learning; and personnel to develop and implement inventory and oversight procedures to facilitate the timely purchase, inventory, distribution and monitoring of purchases made with ESSER funds.

How does the LEA intend to assess and address student learning gaps resulting from the disruption in educational services?

Students will be assessed upon their return to school in the Fall to determine levels of academic competence. For students with significant learning gaps, intervention and remedial services will be employed as part of the student's regular academic program.

What is the LEA's proposed timeline for providing services and assistance to students and staff?

Upon approval of the CARES application, orders for all materials will be placed immediately. Resources for sanitation, training for teachers and administrators, and technology hardware and software for students, once received, will be appropriated and/or scheduled during the summer and early Fall of 2020. All resources are planned to be in place prior to the return of students in August 2020 and throughout the school year 2020-2021 as needed. All expenditures of the funding from the CARES grant will take place no later than September 30, 2022.

How will the LEA use ESSER funds to promote remote learning?

The St. Clair County Board of Education will provide the software necessary for students to continue their academic curriculum in an on-line format, should that need arise. In addition, hardware, such as laptops, etc. will be purchased and issued to students in an effort to provide students with the capabilities to access on-line learning. Mobile "hotspots" will be provided to those families lacking internet services, where necessary.

3. Equitable Services Assurances

The LEA Superintendent or his/her authorized representative assures or certifies the following:

- The LEA receiving ESSER funds will provide equitable services to students and teachers in non-public schools as required under Section 18005 of Division B of the CARES Act.
- The LEA receiving ESSER funds will provide equitable services to students and teachers in non-public schools located within the LEA in the same manner as provided under Section 1117 of the ESEA, as determined through timely and meaningful consultation with representatives of non-public schools.

The private schools in the St. Clair County school district were contacted by numerous emails and by phone about the availability of the CARES funding, and the "Intent to Participate" forms were emailed to them. There were no private schools in the St. Clair County school district that chose to participate in the CARES funding.

4. Other Assurances and Certifications

The LEA Superintendent or his/her authorized representative assures or certifies the following:

- The LEA that receives ESSER funds will, to the greatest extent practicable, continue to compensate its employees and contractors during the period of any disruptions or closures related to COVID-19 in compliance with Section 18006 of Division B of the CARES Act. The application shall cover the participation by that local educational agency in all such programs.

(b) The general application submitted by a local education agency under subsection (a) shall set forth assurances

(1) that the local educational agency will administer each program by the application in accordance with all applicable statutes, regulations, program plans, and applications;

(2) that the control of funds provided to the local educational agency under each program, and title to property acquired with those funds, will be in a public agency and that a public agency will administer those funds and property;

(3) that the local educational agency will use fiscal control and fund accounting procedures that will ensure proper disbursement of, and accounting for, Federal funds paid to that agency under each program;

(4) that the local educational agency will make reports to the State agency or board and to the Secretary as may reasonably be necessary to enable the State agency or board and the Secretary to perform their duties and that the local educational agency will maintain such records, including the records required under section 443, and provide access to those records, as the State agency or board or the Secretary deem necessary to perform their duties;

(5) that the local educational agency will provide reasonable opportunities for the participation by teachers, parents, and other interested agencies, organizations, and individuals in the planning for and operation of each program;

(6) that any application, evaluation, periodic program plan or report relating to each program will be made readily available to parents and other members of the general public;

(7) that in the case of any project involving construction -

(A) the project is not inconsistent with overall State plans for the construction of school facilities, and

(B) in developing plans for construction, due consideration will be given to excellence of architecture and design and to compliance with standards prescribed by the Secretary under section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 in order to ensure that facilities constructed with the use of Federal funds are accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities;

(8) that the local educational agency has adopted effective procedures for acquiring and disseminating to teachers and administrators participating in each program significant information from educational research, demonstrations, and similar projects, and for adopting, where appropriate, promising educational practices developed through such projects; and

(9) that none of the funds expended under any applicable program will be used to acquire equipment (including computer software) in any instance in which such acquisition results in a direct financial benefit to any organization representing the interests of the purchasing entity or its employees or any affiliate of such an organization.

(c) A general application submitted under this section shall remain in effect for the duration of the program it covers. The State agencies or boards administering the programs covered by the application shall not require the submission or amendment of such application unless required by changes in Federal or State law or by other significant change in the circumstances affecting an assurance in such application.

6. Section 427 of the General Education Provisions Act Assurances

(a) The purpose of this section is to assist the Department in implementing the Department's mission to ensure equal access to education and to promote educational excellence throughout the Nation, by -

(1) ensuring equal opportunities to participate for all eligible students, teachers, and other program beneficiaries in any project or activity carried out under an applicable program; and

(2) promoting the ability of such students, teachers, and beneficiaries to meet high standards.

(c) The Secretary may establish criteria and provide technical assistance for meeting the requirements of this section.

(d) Nothing in this section shall be construed to alter in any way the rights or responsibilities established under the laws cited in section 400(d) of this Act.

What steps does the LEA propose to take to permit students, teachers, and other program beneficiaries to overcome barriers (including barriers based on gender, race, color, national origin, disability, and age) that impede equal access to, or participation in, the program?

Through implementation of its current policies, the St. Clair County school system will continue to provide services to students, teachers, and other program beneficiaries without barriers, regardless of the manner in which those services are provided. Should the need arise for school closure, those resources needed by students and/or teachers to provide continuation of the educational program through on-line instruction, will be provided by the school system to those individuals who do not have access to those resources and materials on their own.
