PROGRAMMATIC, FISGAL, AND REPORTING ASSURANCES

The United States Department of Education (USED) has approved the application from the State of Alabama for ESSER funds under the CARES Act. The availability of funds is from 4/29/2020 to 4/29/2021. LEAs will be allowed to expend funds until 9/30/2022. Pre-award costs to the ESSER fund will be allowed for allowable cost incurred on or after March 13, 2020.

2. Allowable Service(s) Assurance

The LEA Superintendent or his/her authorized representative assures or certifies that:

The LEA will use ESSER funds for activities allowable under section 18003(d) of Division B of the CARES Act. How will the LEA determine the most important educational needs as a result of COVID-19?

Students were assessed using IReady, Dibels, and Scantron Express. Data meetings and Rtl meetings have been held for each grade level on a monthly basis to track student progress and alter learning plans. These results have guided our planning for the delivery of instruction in order to fill in learning gaps and recover learning loss as a result of Covid-19. As part of the preparation for student return, buildings will need to be cleaned and sanitized on a regular basis. Continual cleaning will occur throughout the year. Faculty and staff will need PPE (personal protective equipment) to maintain a safe environment.

How does the LEA intend to assess and address student learning gaps resulting from the disruption in educational services?

Talladega County Schools will offer Summer School to our students. There is an in-person component as well as a virtual component for those students who are below grade-level. Credit recovery options are also available for our secondary students. Pre and Post-test assessments will be given. At the start of the 2020-2021 school year, targeted instruction will meet the individual needs of students, including small group intervention, one-on-one intervention, and transition classrooms. All students who were on Tier 2 or Tier 3 Rtl will begin the year on those tiers along with the learning accommodations they were accustomed to prior to our school closures.

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

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What is the LEA's proposed timeline for providing services and assistance to students and staff?

Services began March 16, 2020 with the purchase of additional cleaning supplies and technology supplies to support distance learning. This will continue on a larger scale beginning July 2020 and continuing through September 2021. Additional supplies and supports may be available as needed through September 2022.

How will the LEA use ESSER funds to promote remote learning?

Devices and hotspots will be provided to all students in need. Online curriculum and ebooks will be provided for instruction, assessment, and support for elementary and secondary students.

3. Equitable Services Assurances

- The LEA receiving ESSER funds will provide equitable services to students and teachers in non-public schools as required under Section 18005 of Division B of the CARES Act.

One private school is within the LEA attendance zone. Certified mail was sent on May 27, 2020 to this organization. A phone call was placed on June 2, 2020. No message was left because the mailbox was full. Cobby Smith, chief administrator of County Line Christian Academy, called back and was informed of the CARES Act funding and the letter that was mailed. She stated that she would pick it up from the post office. She said she would contact me later that week. I reminded her that I needed to hear from her by June 5. She never contacted me after that conversation. While conversing with her, she stated that the school is a homeschool and that she is only the liaison for parents.

4. Other Assurances and Certifications

The LEA Superintendent or his/her authorized representative assures or certifies the following:

- The LEA that receives ESSER funds will, to the greatest extent practicable, continue to compensate its employees and contractors during the period of any disruptions or closures related to COVID-19 in compliance with Section 18006 of Division B of the CARES Act. (5) that the local educational agency will provide reasonable opportunities for the participation by teachers, parents, and other interested agencies, organizations, and individuals in the planning for and operation of each program;

(6) that any application, evaluation, periodic program plan or report relating to each program will be made readily available to parents and other members of the general public;

(7) that in the case of any project involving construction -

(A) the project is not inconsistent with overall State plans for the construction of school facilities, and
(B) in developing plans for construction, due consideration will be given to excellence of architecture and design and to compliance with standards prescribed by the Secretary under section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 in order to ensure that facilities constructed with the use of Federal funds are accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities;

(8) that the local educational agency has adopted effective procedures for acquiring and disseminating to teachers and administrators participating in each program significant information from educational research, demonstrations, and similar projects, and for adopting, where appropriate, promising educational practices developed through such projects; and

(9) that none of the funds expended under any applicable program will be used to acquire equipment (including computer software) in any instance in which such acquisition results in a direct financial benefit to any organization representing the interests of the purchasing entity or its employees or any affiliate of such an organization.

(c) A general application submitted under this section shall remain in effect for the duration of the program it covers. The State agencies or boards administering the programs covered by the application shall not require the submission or amendment of such application unless required by changes in Federal or State law or by other significant change in the circumstances affecting an assurance in such application. 6. Section 427 of the General Education Provisions Act Assurances

(a) The purpose of this section is to assist the Department in implementing the Department's mission to ensure equal access to education and to promote educational excellence throughout the Nation, by -

(1) ensuring equal opportunities to participate for all eligible students, teachers, and other program beneficiaries in any project or activity carried out under an applicable program; and

(c) The Secretary may establish criteria and provide technical assistance for meeting the requirements of this section.
 (d) Nothing in this section shall be construed to alter in any way the rights or responsibilities established under the laws cited in section 400(d) of this Act.
