PROGRAMMATIC, FISCAL, AND REPORTING ASSURANCES

The United States Department of Education (USED) has approved the application from the State of Alabama for ESSER funds under the CARES Act. The availability of funds is from 4/29/2020 to 4/29/2021. LEAs will be allowed to expend funds until 9/30/2022. Pre-award costs to the ESSER fund will be allowed for allowable cost incurred on or after March 13, 2020.

2. Allowable Service(s) Assurance

The LEA Superintendent or his/her authorized representative assures or certifies that:

The LEA will use ESSER funds for activities allowable under section 18003(d) of Division B of the CARES Act. How will the LEA determine the most important educational needs as a result of COVID-19?

Leeds City Schools will determine the most important educational needs for the district based on the financial impact of COVID-19. With the anticipation of reduced revenue from local, state and federal funding sources, the greatest percentage of our annual operating budget, (personnel costs), will be the focus for supplemental support.

How does the LEA intend to assess and address student learning gaps resulting from the disruption in educational services?

Leeds City Schools will assess and address learning gaps by using pre and post assessment data to target learning deficits among its students. This data will indicate the level and severity of disruption in educational services from March 2020 to present, and provide the framework for meeting the instructional needs of students in Pre-K through 12th grade. Assessment platforms will include Global Scholar, DIBELS, aimsweb.

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What is the LEA's proposed timeline for providing services and assistance to students and staff?

July, 2020: Summer Reading Camp to provide K through 3rd grade students with direct, explicit, and systematic reading intervention services and supports in an online format,

August, 2020: Begin before and after school tutoring and intervention services for students. Begin online Instruction options through Edgenuity, and Google Classroom. Professional development for teachers in using new state assessment and virtual teaching platforms.

August 2020 - September 30, 2022: Continue to provide services and assistance to students and staff as needed.

How will the LEA use ESSER funds to promote remote learning?

ESSER funds will be used to provide classroom teachers who will use embedded training in remote instruction. Virtual teachers will offer real-time classes to students who have opted not to attend school due to COVID-19 concerns.

3. Equitable Services Assurances

The LEA Superintendent or his/her authorized representative assures or certifies the following:

- The LEA receiving ESSER funds will provide equitable services to students and teachers in non-public schools as required under Section 18005 of Division B of the CARES Act.

Leeds has one private school within its attendance zones. Equitable service funds will be used by this school to provide cleaning supplies and technology for its staff. Timely and meaningful consultation will continue to occur between the LEA and the private school in the form of electronic and face to face meetings, using current safety guidelines. The proposed timeline for implementation of services and assistance will begin in October, 2020 and continue through September 30, 2022.

4. Other Assurances and Certifications

The LEA SuperIntendent or his/her authorized representative assures or certifies the following:

- The LEA that receives ESSER funds will, to the greatest extent practicable, continue to compensate its
 employees and contractors during the period of any disruptions or closures related to COVID-19 in
 compliance with Section 18006 of Division B of the CARES Act. In addition, LEAs that accept funds will
 continue to pay employees and contractors to the greatest extent practicable based on the unique financial
 circumstances of the LEA. CARES Act funds generally will not be used for bonuses, merit pay, or similar

5. Section 442 of the General Education Provisions Act Assurances

The application shall cover the participation by that local educational agency in all such programs.

(4) that the local educational agency will make reports to the State agency or board and to the Secretary as may reasonably be necessary to enable the State agency or board and the Secretary to perform their duties and that the local educational agency will maintain such records, including the records required under section 443, and provide access to those records, as the State agency or board or the Secretary deem necessary to perform their duties;

(5) that the local educational agency will provide reasonable opportunities for the participation by teachers, parents, and other interested agencies, organizations, and individuals in the planning for and operation of each program;

(6) that any application, evaluation, periodic program plan or report relating to each program will be made readily available to parents and other members of the general public;

(7) that in the case of any project involving construction -

(A) the project is not inconsistent with overall State plans for the construction of school facilities, and

(B) in developing plans for construction, due consideration will be given to excellence of architecture and design and to compliance with standards prescribed by the Secretary under section 504 of the

Rehabilitation Act of 1973 in order to ensure that facilities constructed with the use of Federal funds are

accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities;

(8) that the local educational agency has adopted effective procedures for acquiring and disseminating to teachers and administrators participating in each program significant information from educational research, demonstrations, and similar projects, and for adopting, where appropriate, promising educational practices developed through such projects; and

(9) that none of the funds expended under any applicable program will be used to acquire equipment (including computer software) in any instance in which such acquisition results in a direct financial benefit to any organization representing the interests of the purchasing entity or its employees or any affiliate of such an organization.
 (c) A general application submitted under this section shall remain in effect for the duration of the program it covers. The State agencies or boards administering the programs covered by the application shall not require the submission or amendment of such application unless required by changes in Federal or State law or by other significant change in the circumstances affecting an assurance in such application.

6. Section 427 of the General Education Provisions Act Assurances

(a) The purpose of this section is to assist the Department in implementing the Department's mission to ensure equal access to education and to promote educational excellence throughout the Nation, by -

(1) ensuring equal opportunities to participate for all eligible students, teachers, and other program beneficiaries in any project or activity carried out under an applicable program; and

(2) promoting the ability of such students, teachers, and beneficiaries to meet high standards.

(c) The Secretary may establish criteria and provide technical assistance for meeting the requirements of this section.
 (d) Nothing in this section shall be construed to alter in any way the rights or responsibilities established under the laws cited in section 400(d) of this Act.
