How will the LEA determine the most important educational needs as a result of COVID-19?

The district determined the most important educational needs for the 20-21 school year based on staffteacher survey results due to the spring 2020 COVID-19 school closure. Based on these survey results, the expenditures in the itemized budget were determined, which includes the following items; 50% Technology Coordinator with benefits; 3 Custodians with benefits; Janitorial Supplies; Custodial Services; 6 ChromeBook Cases & Charging Stations; 3 Virtual Teachers with benefits; EL Translator with benefits; Transportation Costs; Maintenance Supplies; Elevation K-12; Telephone services for communication; Professional Development - MANDT, Mental Health/First Aide, Google Classroom, Zoom, Webpage, & PowerSchool; SchoolStatus - Parent Communication; and Ipads

How does the LEA intend to assess and address student learning gaps resulting from the disruption in educational services?

The district used staff and parent surveys (Summer 2020) to determine learning gaps and educational disruptions that occurred during the COVID-19 school closure. We will assess and address student learning gaps resulting from the disruption in educational services by providing distance learning and virtual professional development for our teachers and students. We will also ensure consistent communication with parents, teachers, staff, and students to make sure that everyone is "on the same page" concerning plans and expectations. In addition, a deep-cleaning will be completed prior to students/staff returning to the school buildings.

Services will begin July 2020 and continue throughout the 2021-2022 school year.

The district will use these funds to employ a Technology Coordinator and virtual teachers to provide additional support to teachers as they deliver distance learning to students. It will also fund an ESL aide to provide translation and academic support for students and families.

 - (7) that in the case of any project involving construction -
 - (A) the project is not inconsistent with overall State plans for the construction of school facilities, and (B) in developing plans for construction, due consideration will be given to excellence of architecture and design and to compliance with standards prescribed by the Secretary under section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 in order to ensure that facilities constructed with the use of Federal funds are accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities;
- (8) that the local educational agency has adopted effective procedures for acquiring and disseminating to teachers and administrators participating in each program significant information from educational research, demonstrations, and similar projects, and for adopting, where appropriate, promising educational practices developed through such projects; and

We are providing 1:1 Chromebook access to all students. We are also providing mobile access points/hot spots throughout our city to provide equitable Internet access for our students. In addition, we will provide an ESL aide and provide professional learning for our staff on providing distance learning to ELL students and students with disabilities.
