PROGRAMMATIC, FISCAL, AND REPORTING ASSURANCES

The United States Department of Education (USED) has approved the application from the State of Alabama for ESSER funds under the CARES Act. The availability of funds is from 4/29/2020 to 4/29/2021. LEAs will be allowed to expend funds until 9/30/2022. Pre-award costs to the ESSER fund will be allowed for allowable cost incurred on or after March 13, 2020.

2. Allowable Service(s) Assurance

The LEA Superintendent or his/her authorized representative assures or certifies that:

The LEA will use ESSER funds for activities allowable under section 18003(d) of Division B of the CARES Act. How will the LEA determine the most important educational needs as a result of COVID-19?

The LEA conducted a comprehensive needs assessment. Administrators and other stakeholders were invited to discuss how to best use the Cares Act funds to support students. Data meetings were using data from DiBELS, STAR Reading, STAR Math, Scantron and Pre ACT to determine the best way to deliver instruction in order to fill the learning gap caused by COVID-19. We used the data meeting results to guide our planning as part of the preparation for student return. We also used the needs assessment data to determine the needs of the schools to be cleaned and sanitized on a regular basis. The LEA also reviewed academic data, attendance data, safety data and any other data pertinent to the support of local schools during COVID-19. Ongoing cleaning will occur throughout the upcoming year. A non public school consultation of all participating private schools was held to discuss their needs and to conduct a comprehensive needs assessment.

How does the LEA intend to assess and address student learning gaps resulting from the disruption in educational services?

In addressing student learning gaps resulting from disruption in educational services, Clay County Schools will offer a summer reading program for student for grades K-6. This face to face program will help students who are reading below grade level. Edgenuity for credit recovery will be used as an option for secondary students. Progress monitoring through STAR Reading and DiBELS will be administered in a pre, mid, and post assessment. During the 2020-2021 school year small group instruction to target instruction and after school tutoring will be provided on en as needed bases. Students will be provided extra help through Tier 2 and Tier 3. Students will begin the school year in the same Tier group. Pull out instruction will be given to those Tier 3 students for individualized instruction. A virtual curriculum will be offered as needed. PD will be provide to all teachers in the areas of reading, meth and virtual teerning. ESL students will receive individualized instruction with the help of Edmenum.

What is the LEA's proposed timeline for providing services and assistance to students and staff?

Clay County School started services to reduce the learning gap in March 2020. During this time all classroom teachers developed packets for each student. Packets were distributed at each school by grade level and teacher. During the months of July 2020-September 2021 additional cleaning supplies will be purchased for summer school and the beginning of the 2020-2021 school year. The purchase of Chromebooks and WiFI equipment will also be be purchased during July 2020-September 2021. Additional supplies will be purchased as needed through Saptember 2022.

How will the LEA use ESSER funds to promote remote learning?

- 1. Purchase additional technology, such as tablets, laptops and WiFi which includes hotspots (when needed)
- Provide distance learning materials to ensure that only the highest-quality products are used.
- 3. Provide an online curriculumetearning program for students who choose not to receive face-to-face instructions for safety reasons.
- 3. Provide Professional development on delivering distance learning and social-emotional supports.

3. Equitable Services Assurances

The LEA has two private achoots within the district attendance zone. A certified Cares Act Intent to Participate letter was sent on May 27, 2020 to each non-public school, Both schools returned the intent letter indicating their intentions to participate. A consultation with each school was held on June 11, 2020. All forms were completed. Non-public school elicoations are being used in the areas of technology, PPE and cleaning supplies. Proposed timeline July 2020 - September 2021 purchase Chromebooks and supplies. These purchase will be on going as neaded through September 2022.
