

Tips for Writing a Response for Text-Dependent Writing (TDW) Informative/Explanatory Grades 4 and 5

The Writer's Checklist was designed to help you understand the expectations of the TDW.

Writer's Checklist

PROOFREAD after you write your informative/explanatory essay.

I addressed all parts of the writing task.
I included evidence from the text(s) to support ideas in my essay.
I stayed organized and focused on the writing task.
I used correct language, a variety of sentence types, and transitions in my essay
I corrected errors in sentence formation, punctuation, capitalization, grammar,
usage, and spelling.
I reread my essay to make sure it was clear and well organized.

- 1. The TDW requires an **extended response**. Your response must be focused on the task and be organized to include a strong introduction, body, and conclusion. The writing needs to be clear and well organized.
 - Organization matters. A TDW response needs to be structured in a logical way. Your
 thoughts need to be organized in a way that makes sense for readers. Transitional
 words and phrases should be used to show logical connections and to clarify the flow
 of your writing.
- 3. You **MUST support** your response with **evidence** from the text(s). The evidence can be cited word for word from the text(s) or it can be paraphrased.
 - 4. Answering the TDW requires higher-level thinking skills.
 - **Think:** Read the TDW task and analyze the text(s) to determine how to address the writing task.
 - Infer: Use evidence and your own logic to provide a new idea about why the examples you provided matter to the task and relate to the evidence.
 - **Examine:** Search the text(s) for examples and evidence to use in your writing that support your ideas.
 - Elaborate: Explain what the evidence means.
