PROGRAMMATIC, FISCAL, AND REPORTING ASSURANCES

The United States Department of Education (USED) has approved the application from the State of Alabama for ESSER funds under the CARES Act. The availability of funds is from 4/29/2020 to 4/29/2021. How will the LEA determine the most important educational needs as a result of COVID-19?

Randolph County Schools has conducted and continues to conduct needs assessments with Google Forms surveys of students, parents, and school employees; progress monitoring assessments; classroom grades; and discussions with teachers, counselors, and administrators. Randolph County Schools will follow the Alabama Department of Education, Alabama Department of Public Health, Randolph County Health Department and Centers for Disease Control guidelines where appropriate.

How does the LEA intend to assess and address student learning gaps resulting from the disruption in educational services?

During the summer, students in grades K-1 who have the greatest deficits in reading will be provided summer intervention from our RCBOE Reading Specialists. All students in grades K-2 will receive books to encourage reading practice. When students return to school, they will be given a STAR assessment to determine what areas of intervention are needed. Intervention plans will need to be made by classroom teachers to remediate students on standards not achieved while still providing appropriate grade level instruction.

What is the LEA's proposed timeline for providing services and assistance to students and staff?

Professional development is on-going June 2020 and will continue as needed. Randolph County Schools plans to have Laptops and tripods (to use with SWIVLs, and IPADs purchased other funding sources) available as teachers return to work in August 2020. Computer repair is on-going. Advertisements are on-going as needed starting in July 2020. Cleaning products, cleaning equipment, sanitizing products, sanitizing machines, thermometers, and personal protective equipment were ordered to distribute as employees and students return in August 2020. Addition cleaning and sanitizing products will be purchased as needed. In April and May of 2020 packets were mailed to students without Internet access. Supplemental pay for nurses and custodians to work off-contract will start in July 2020. Additional instructional programs, materials and supplies will be purchased as needed as needed starting in August 2020. Off contract administrators and off-contract teachers will be paid to work at Summer School and Reading Camps during the summer of 2021. All funds will be expended by September 30, 2022.

How will the LEA use ESSER funds to promote remote learning?

1. The Tripod (CARES) will be used with an Ipad and Swivl (Video capture device) for streaming and recording lessons

2. Laptops for employees to work remotely

3. Repair of technology as needed

4. Instructional program(s) for remote learning

5. Advertisements to notify parents and the community of school plans and schedule changes due to Covid-19

6. Postage and envelopes for mailing packets to student preferring paper

3. Equitable Services Assurances

(5) that the local educational agency will provide reasonable opportunities for the participation by teachers, parents, and other interested agencies, organizations, and individuals in the planning for and operation of each program;

(6) that any application, evaluation, periodic program plan or report relating to each program will be made readily available to parents and other members of the general public;

(7) that in the case of any project involving construction -

(A) the project is not inconsistent with overall State plans for the construction of school facilities, and (B) in developing plans for construction, due consideration will be given to excellence of architecture and design and to compliance with standards prescribed by the Secretary under section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 in order to ensure that facilities constructed with the use of Federal funds are accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities;

(8) that the local educational agency has adopted effective procedures for acquiring and disseminating to teachers and administrators participating in each program significant information from educational research, demonstrations, and similar projects, and for adopting, where appropriate, promising educational practices developed through such projects; and

(9) that none of the funds expended under any applicable program will be used to acquire equipment (including computer software) in any instance in which such acquisition results in a direct financial benefit to any organization representing the interests of the purchasing entity or its employees or any affiliate of such an organization.
(c) A general application submitted under this section shall remain in effect for the duration of the program it covers. The State agencies or boards administering the programs covered by the application shall not require the submission or amendment of such application unless required by changes in Federal or State law or by other significant change in the circumstances affecting an assurance in such application.

6. Section 427 of the General Education Provisions Act Assurances

(a) The purpose of this section is to assist the Department in implementing the Department's mission to ensure equal access to education and to promote educational excellence throughout the Nation, by -

(1) ensuring equal opportunities to participate for all eligible students, teachers, and other program beneficiaries in any project or activity carried out under an applicable program; and

(c) The Secretary may establish criteria and provide technical assistance for meeting the requirements of this section. (d) Nothing in this section shall be construed to alter in any way the rights or responsibilities established under the laws cited in section 400(d) of this Act.

What steps does the LEA propose to take to permit students, teachers, and other program beneficiaries to overcome barriers (including barriers based on gender, race, color, national origin, disability, and age) that impede equal access to, or participation in, the program?

Randolph County Schools uses telephones, emails, social media, Web page, advertisements, posters, and mail to inform all students, teachers, staff, community and other program beneficiaries of programs available. Media is translated into non-English languages as needed by technology or translators. Programs and technology are available for special needs students including special education students, English Learners, 504 and students with dyslexia. Randolph County Schools' facilities are handicap accessible. The Randolph County Board of Education does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, disability, or age in its programs and activities and provides equal access to Boy Scouts of America and other designated youth groups.
