PROGRAMMATIC, FISCAL, AND REPORTING ASSURANCES

The United States Department of Education (USED) has approved the application from the State of Alabama for ESSER funds under the CARES Act. The availability of funds is from 4/29/2020 to 4/29/2021. LEAs will be allowed to expend funds until 9/30/2022. Pre-award costs to the ESSER fund will be allowed for allowable cost incurred on or after March 13, 2020.

How will the LEA determine the most important educational needs as a result of COVID-19?

Blount County Schools conducted multiple surveys to gather input from parents, community stakeholders, teachers and administrators. After this data was gathered, we developed a survey analysis and presented to a collaborative team. This team met on multiple occasions to identify the priorities for these funds and then to begin getting a first draft of the budget prepared. With collaborative input, the draft became more firm and was discussed with the Blount County Board of Education for input.

How does the LEA intend to assess and address student learning gaps resulting from the disruption in educational services?

Blount County Schools is planning to use Aimsweb to assess our students upon the opening of the school year to identify current student proficiency. School leadership teams, as well as, Problem Solving Teams, Grade level teams and individual teachers will review this data along with the same student's data from the previous year to identify learning gaps for each individual student. Each school will begin to organize their students to receive targeted learning supports depending on the specific needs of each child.

What is the LEA's proposed timeline for providing services and assistance to students and staff?

Blount County Schools began providing services on April 29, 2020 and will continue providing services and assistance through the availability of the CARES Act ESSER Funding grant of September 30, 2022.

How will the LEA use ESSER funds to promote remote learning?

Utilizing the information we received from parents about the limited availability of devices adequate to support distance learning and the lack of adequate internet service, we prioritized these two areas in our budget. Remote learning will be promoted by the purchase of additional devices, equipment to enable buses to create wifi zones in targeted areas, and professional development for teachers on effective use of learning management systems. We will provide PDF modifier for schoology.

3. Equitable Services Assurances

- (6) that any application, evaluation, periodic program plan or report relating to each program will be made readily available to parents and other members of the general public;
 - (7) that in the case of any project involving construction -
 - (A) the project is not inconsistent with overall State plans for the construction of school facilities, and (B) in developing plans for construction, due consideration will be given to excellence of architecture and design and to compliance with standards prescribed by the Secretary under section SO4 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 in order to ensure that facilities constructed with the use of Federal funds are accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities;
- (8) that the local educational agency has adopted effective procedures for acquiring and disseminating to teachers and administrators participating in each program significant information from educational research, demonstrations, and similar projects, and for adopting, where appropriate, promising educational practices developed through such projects; and
- (9) that none of the funds expended under any applicable program will be used to acquire equipment (including computer software) in any instance in which such acquisition results in a direct financial benefit to any organization representing the interests of the purchasing entity or its employees or any affiliate of such an organization.
 (c) A general application submitted under this section shall remain in effect for the duration of the program it covers.
