PROGRAMMATIC, FISCAL, AND REPORTING ASSURANCES

The United States Department of Education (USED) has approved the application from the State of Alabama for ESSER funds under the CARES Act. The availability of funds is from 4/29/2020 to 4/29/2021. LEAs will be allowed to expend funds until 9/30/2022. Pre-award costs to the ESSER fund will be allowed for allowable cost incurred on or after March 13, 2020.

2. Allowable Service(s) Assurance

The LEA Superintendent or his/her authorized representative assures or certifies that:

The LEA will use ESSER funds for activities allowable under section 18003(d) of Division B of the CARES Act. The United States Department of Education does not consider the following to be an allowable use of ESSER funds, under any part of 18003: 1) subsidizing or offsetting executive salaries and benefits of individuals who are not employees of the SEA or LEAs or 2) expenditures related to state or local teacher or faculty unions or associations.

How will the LEA determine the most important educational needs as a result of COVID-19?

Alabaster City Schools will look at the critical standards as outlined by the Alabama State Department of Education to measure students' level of master with those standards. Grades from the previous school year; as well as benchmark testing, and progress monitoring assessments will be considered.

How does the LEA intend to assess and address student learning gaps resulting from the disruption in educational services?

Alabaster City Schools will use the following assessments at the beginning of the 2020-2021 school year to determine student needs:

K-3 sill administer Early Math and Early Reading assessments as outline by the Alabama State Department of Education. Almsweb will be administered on the Local Education Agency level.

K-3 will also be administered Reading Benchmark assessments, and locally developed phonics assessments, as well as main fluency assessments. *Grades 2-10 will take Scantron Reading and Math assessments.

Grades 4-5 will be administered Reading Benchmark assessments.

Grades 10-12 will use data from previous state assessments as well as 10th grade taking the Pre-ACT in the Fall.

*Alabaster City Schools will address student learning gaps resulting from the disruption in educational services by offering Summer Reading Camp for grades K-3, Summer Reading and Enrichment Camp for grades 4 and 5, and Summer Credit Recovery opportunities for grades 4 and 5, and Summer Credit Recovery opportunities for grades 6-12. When school reopens we will also offer Tiered Intervention as appropriate for all grades.

What is the LEA's proposed timeline for providing services and assistance to students and staff?

March 2020 through September 30, 2022.

How will the LEA use ESSER funds to promote remote learning?

Alabaster City Schools will provide distance learning opportunities for students during school closures. This includes providing devices, training teachers, providing support to parents, and ensuring connectivity.

During the Spring 2020 school closure, packets were provided for/to K-3 students, and any other student who needed that additional support.

3. Equitable Services Assurances

Equitable services for the CARES Act funding were extended to the non-public/private schools within our school district. They declined to receive the services offered. This same information has been submitted to the Alabama State Department of Education in a separate equitable services platform.

The LEA Superintendent or his/her authorized representative assures or certifies the following:

(5) that the local educational agency will provide reasonable opportunities for the participation by teachers, parents, and other interested agencies, organizations, and individuals in the planning for and operation of each program;

(6) that any application, evaluation, periodic program plan or report relating to each program will be made readily available to parents and other members of the general public;

(7) that in the case of any project involving construction -

(A) the project is not inconsistent with overall State plans for the construction of school facilities, and (B) in developing plans for construction, due consideration will be given to excellence of architecture and design and to compliance with standards prescribed by the Secretary under section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 in order to ensure that facilities constructed with the use of Federal funds are

accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities;

(8) that the local educational agency has adopted effective procedures for acquiring and disseminating to teachers and administrators participating in each program significant information from educational research, demonstrations, and similar projects, and for adopting, where appropriate, promising educational practices developed through such projects; and

(9) that none of the funds expended under any applicable program will be used to acquire equipment (including computer software) in any instance in which such acquisition results in a direct financial benefit to any organization representing the interests of the purchasing entity or its employees or any affiliate of such an organization.
(c) A general application submitted under this section shall remain in effect for the duration of the program it covers. The

State agencies or boards administering the programs covered by the application shall not require the submission or amendment of such application unless required by changes in Federal or State law or by other significant change in the circumstances affecting an assurance in such application.

6. Section 427 of the General Education Provisions Act Assurances

(a) The purpose of this section is to assist the Department in Implementing the Department's mission to ensure qual access to education and to promote educational excellence throughout the Nation, by ~

(1) ensuring equal opportunities to participate for all eligible students, teachers, and other program beneficial is in any project or activity carried out under an applicable program; and

(c) The Secretary may establish criteria and provide technical assistance for meeting the requirements of this section. (d) Nothing in this section shall be construed to alter in any way the rights or responsibilities established under the laws cited in section 400(d) of this Act.
