PROGRAMMATIC, FISCAL, AND REPORTING ASSURANCES

The United States Department of Education (USED) has approved the application from the State of Alabama for ESSER funds under the CARES Act. The availability of funds is from 4/29/2020 to 4/29/2021. How will the LEA determine the most important educational needs as a result of COVID-19?

The Perry County School District has determined the most important educational needs as a result of COVID-19 by conducting a needs assessment based a comparative analysis of the obtainment of academic grade level content standards, special education services, and the level of professional development that will be required for staff to effectively deliver instructional content that will accommodate the educational needs of the students; thus creating an individualized learning plan for each student. The results of the needs assessment indicate that our priorities will be technology enhancements for remote and on site learning opportunities, instructional software, health care services and equipment, and purchased services for support such as staff training and mental health.

How does the LEA intend to assess and address student learning gaps resulting from the disruption in educational services?

The Perry County School District intends to assess and address student learning gaps resulting from the disruption in educational services by analyzing benchmark assessment data. An initial benchmark assessment will be administered. Pre and Post Pandemic benchmark assessments will be analyzed to determine the progress or regression of the obtainment of content standards.

The Perry County School District will purchase additional devices to replace outdated devices, equip additional school buses with hotspot capabilities to be placed strategically throughout the community to equalize students having access to internet access, schoolwide technology upgrades to accommodate the infrastructure needed for programs to effectively operate.

(6) that any application, evaluation, periodic program plan or report relating to each program will be made readily available to parents and other members of the general public;

(7) that in the case of any project involving construction -

(A) the project is not inconsistent with overall State plans for the construction of school facilities, and
(B) in developing plans for construction, due consideration will be given to excellence of architecture and design and to compliance with standards prescribed by the Secretary under section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 in order to ensure that facilities constructed with the use of Federal funds are accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities;

(8) that the local educational agency has adopted effective procedures for acquiring and disseminating to teachers and administrators participating in each program significant information from educational research, demonstrations, and similar projects, and for adopting, where appropriate, promising educational practices developed through such projects; and

(9) that none of the funds expended under any applicable program will be used to acquire equipment (including computer software) in any instance in which such acquisition results in a direct financial benefit to any organization representing the interests of the purchasing entity or its employees or any affiliate of such an organization.
(c) A general application submitted under this section shall remain in effect for the duration of the program it covers.
