PROGRAMMATIC, FISCAL, AND REPORTING ASSURANCES

The United States Department of Education (USED) has approved the application from the State of Alabama for ESSER funds under the CARES Act. The availability of funds is from 4/29/2020 to 4/29/2021. LEAs will be allowed to expend funds until 9/30/2022. Pre-award costs to the ESSER fund will be allowed for allowable cost incurred on or after March 13, 2020.

2. Allowable Service(s) Assurance

The LEA Superintendent or his/her authorized representative assures or certifies that:

The LEA will use ESSER funds for activities allowable under section 18003(d) of Division B of the CARES Act. The United States Department of Education does not consider the following to be an allowable use of ESSER funds, under any part of 18003: 1) subsidizing or offsetting executive salaries and benefits of individuals who are not employees of the SEA or LEAs or 2) expenditures related to state or local teacher or faculty unions or associations.

How will the LEA determine the most important educational needs as a result of COVID-19?

Students will participate in a wide range of asssesments during the first weeks of school, including the K-3 Early Assessment Program and in Math and Reading for Grades 4-8 through i-Ready, Oral Reading assessments, Scantron for Grades 9-12. In addition, teachers will perform informal checks for understanding of critical standards. These assessments will also continue throughout the school year, with the End-of-Year Assessment in May of 2022.
Health assessment data shared by Alabama Department of Public Health, local health agencies, and school nurse imput will determine the schools' ongoing needs for sanitation equipment, supplies, and PPEs. Another identified need it to hire temporary nurses to help monitor COVID symptoms, assist with contract tracing (FY21) at the swcools that do not have a school nurse. Abother need is to employee a virtual school teacher to support the students and families who sleected virtual school options (through September 30, 2022).

How does the LEA intend to assess and address student learning gaps resulting from the disruption in educational services?

Students in K-3 will participate in specially desinged curriculum to fill the gaps that may be a result of COVID-19 school closures. These materials are designed to be compatible with the beginning of the year materials already implemented in our classrooms. School will also host literacy camps as an after school activity for the students who most need literacy intervention, through September 30, 2022. Students in grades 4-12 will participate in intervention programs that inloude small group instruction, additional tutoring, and digital tools to address hite gaps that exist in learning. Our curriculum will also include a spiral review of critical standards throughout the school year for all grades to ensure that students revisit information that may be forgotten. Our district's 1:1 technology plan will allow students to have technology needed to access learning htat will assist in filling these gaps.

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What is the LEA's proposed timeline for providing services and assistance to students and staff?

Summer 2020 - Purchase Chromebooks, sanitation equipment, PPEs.

August 2020 - Train teachers on new policies and procedures related to academics, instruction, and COVID learning loss; Assessment of students to determine learning gaps

August 2020-September 30, 2022 - Measure student progress through the use of formative assessments, hold data meetings to identify individual needs and planning for instruction, provide support for students and teachers; acquisition of additional sanitation equipment, supplies, and PPEs as needed.

How will the LEA use ESSER funds to promote remote learning?

A key component of our plan for 2020-2022 is to purchase Chromebooks in an effort to establish a 1:1 initiative for students in grades 2-12. Students in K-1 will be provided existing devices but purchases will be made to supplement those devices. We will continue to explore resources that offer both paper/pencil options and a digital option to allow for students, teachers, and parents to make a seamless transition in the event of a prolonged closure or transition to remote learning. All students will have the option to choose instruction through Alabama's online learning platform. Students will also have the option to enroll in the DeKalb County Schools Virtual Academy in FY21, and this will be extended to Gradeds 6-12 in FY22.

3. Equitable Services Assurances

The LEA Superintendent or his/her authorized representative assures or certifies the following:

Both private schools within the district have been contacted to notify them of the opportunity for their studentes and teachers to obtain equitable services under the CARES ACT programs. Through this initial contact, services available under the CARES ACT program and how non-public schools' students and teachers can participate were explained. Both private schools opted out of receiving services granted in CARES.

Documentation of consultation has been forwarded to the appropriate contact in the federal programs section at the ALSDE.

4. Other Assurances and Certifications

The LEA Superintendent or his/her authorized representative assures or certifies the following:

- The LEA that receives ESSER funds will, to the greatest extent practicable, continue to compensate its employees and contractors during the period of any disruptions or closures related to COVID-19 in compliance with Section 18006 of Division B of the CARES Act. - (5) that the local educational agency will provide reasonable opportunities for the participation by teachers, parents, and other interested agencies, organizations, and individuals in the planning for and operation of each program;
- (6) that any application, evaluation, periodic program plan or report relating to each program will be made readily available to parents and other members of the general public;
 - (7) that in the case of any project involving construction -
 - (A) the project is not inconsistent with overall State plans for the construction of school facilities, and
 - (8) in developing plans for construction, due consideration will be given to excellence of architecture and design and to compliance with standards prescribed by the Secretary under section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 in order to ensure that facilities constructed with the use of Federal funds are accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities;
- (8) that the local educational agency has adopted effective procedures for acquiring and disseminating to teachers and administrators participating in each program significant information from educational research, demonstrations, and similar projects, and for adopting, where appropriate, promising educational practices developed through such projects; and
- (9) that none of the funds expended under any applicable program will be used to acquire equipment (including computer software) in any instance in which such acquisition results in a direct financial benefit to any organization representing the interests of the purchasing entity or its employees or any affiliate of such an organization.
- (c) A general application submitted under this section shall remain in effect for the duration of the program it covers. The State agencies or boards administering the programs covered by the application shall not require the submission or amendment of such application unless required by changes in Federal or State law or by other significant change in the circumstances affecting an assurance in such application.

6. Section 427 of the General Education Provisions Act Assurances

- (a) The purpose of this section is to assist the Department in implementing the Department's mission to ensure equal access to education and to promote educational excellence throughout the Nation, by -
- (1) ensuring equal opportunities to participate for all eligible students, teachers, and other program beneficiaries in any project or activity carried out under an applicable program; and

- (d) Nothing in this section shall be construed to alter in any way the rights or responsibilities established under the laws cited in section 400(d) of this Act.

What steps does the LEA propose to take to permit students, teachers, and other program beneficiaries to overcome barriers (including barriers based on gender, race, color, national origin, disability, and age) that impede equal access to, or participation in, the program?

Professional learning on how to effectively instruct students through digital platforms and how to use data to identify student learning gaps will be provided to all teachers prior to students returning to campus in August 2021. Special Education teachers will evaluate students' most appropriate learning style/modality, will provide materials/devices, and offer training to caregivers and service providers to meet individual student needs as a good faith effort to allow students to access and make progress in the general curriculum and IEP goals.
