PROGRAMMATIC, FISCAL, AND REPORTING ASSURANCES

The United States Department of Education (USED) has approved the application from the State of Alabama for ESSER funds under the CARES Act. The availability of funds is from 4/29/2020 to 4/29/2021. LEAs will be allowed to expend funds until 9/30/2022. Pre-award costs to the ESSER fund will be allowed for allowable cost incurred on or after March 13, 2020.

2. Allowable Service(s) Assurance

The LEA Superintendent or his/her authorized representative assures or certifies that:

The LEA will use ESSER funds for activities allowable under section 18003(d) of Division B of the CARES Act. How will the LEA determine the most important educational needs as a result of COVID-19?

ECS conducted a comprehensive needs assessment to determine the important educational, health and safety needs of the students and staff in each school. The needs assessment was reviewed by a committee that included district and local-school staff, community stakeholders and parents. The committee determination of how the funds would be utilized was based on review of all available data, sound educational principles, and ALSDE guidelines. Based on the needs assessment, the district determined the following areas needed would be essential in response to COVID-19: technology, PPE, school re-opening planning, virtual and remote programs and cleaning/santitization materials and equipment.

How does the LEA Intend to assess and address student learning gaps resulting from the disruption in educational services?

ECS will utilize the district progress monitoring assessments to determine the needs of the students. Students will be assessed during the first weeks of school to identify deficiencies. Learning gaps will be addressed with targeted instruction, scaffolded within the standards for the current year/grade level of the student. Students will also be grouped based on specific standard deficiencies. Small group standard-based instruction, using tier models, will be utilized to reinforce specific skills and knowledge.

How will the LEA use ESSER funds to promote remote learning?

In the event of another school closure scenario, ECS will utilize ESSER funds to provide internet access to as many students and families in the district as possible using a variety of methods. ECS is currently surveying the families in the district to determine, as accurately as possible, what the needs are for student access as well as how many families would prefer a virtual option over face-to-face interactions. Students will receive age-appropriate devices to complete their school work. Work will either be provided remotely or in an "off-line" platform, depending on access.

3. Equitable Services Assurances

- (6) that any application, evaluation, periodic program plan or report relating to each program will be made readily available to parents and other members of the general public;
- (7) that in the case of any project involving construction -
 - (A) the project is not inconsistent with overall State plans for the construction of school facilities, and (B) in developing plans for construction, due consideration will be given to excellence of architecture and design and to compliance with standards prescribed by the Secretary under section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 in order to ensure that facilities constructed with the use of Federal funds are accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities;
- (8) that the local educational agency has adopted effective procedures for acquiring and disseminating to teachers and administrators participating in each program significant information from educational research, demonstrations, and similar projects, and for adopting, where appropriate, promising educational practices developed through such projects; and
- (9) that none of the funds expended under any applicable program will be used to acquire equipment (including computer software) in any instance in which such acquisition results in a direct financial benefit to any organization representing the interests of the purchasing entity or its employees or any affiliate of such an organization.

 (c) A general application submitted under this section shall remain in effect for the duration of the program it covers. The State agencies or boards administering the programs covered by the application shall not require the submission or amendment of such application unless required by changes in Federal or State law or by other significant change in the circumstances affecting an assurance in such application.

6. Section 427 of the General Education Provisions Act Assurances

- (a) The purpose of this section is to assist the Department in implementing the Department's mission to ensure equal access to education and to promote educational excellence throughout the Nation, by -
- (1) ensuring equal opportunities to participate for all eligible students, teachers, and other program beneficiaries in any project or activity carried out under an applicable program; and

What steps does the LEA propose to take to permit students, teachers, and other program beneficiaries to overcome barriers (including barriers based on gender, race, color, national origin, disability, and age) that impede equal access to, or participation in, the program?

It is the goal of Escambia County Schools to prevent barriers to teaching and learning. By working to provide a wide-variety of learning options and platforms, ECS can ensure that all students will receive the services needed to meet their educational, health and safety needs. If any barriers arise from any stakeholders, we will work to resolve them as quickly as possible.
