How does the LEA intend to assess and address student learning gaps resulting from the disruption in educational services?

These pre-assessments will be done using a combination of assessments depending upon the grade levels of students. What is the LEA's proposed timeline for providing services and assistance to students and staff?

The proposed timeline for providing services and assistance to students and staff is June 2020 - March 2022.

How will the LEA use ESSER funds to promote remote learning?

The use of digital devices purchased through the use of ESSER funds will be provided to students in a 1:1 initiative so that each student in grades 6-12 will be able to take a device home for remote tearning. The purchase of hotspots and Cradlepoint devices will ensure equity for all students to have equity for access to the Internet to use these devices for remote tearning. Funds will be used to purchase ClassLink, which will provide a single sign on access for remote tearning sites and activities so that students can easily access content designed specifically for them by teachers for given courses. Content filtering purchased to allow off campus monitoring and digital safety will provide students with the option to participate in remote tearning in a digital environment that is safe regardless of whether they are on or off campus networks for connection. BookTracks inventory systems will allow district leaders to track and manage devices to ensure all students in grades 6-12 have access to remote tearning while at home. PowerSchool Analytics will allow educators to see real time data regarding students' progress whether they are learning at home or at school in order to inform changes to instruction or improvements for intervention.

3. Equitable Services Assurances

 - (7) that in the case of any project involving construction -
 - (A) the project is not inconsistent with overall State plans for the construction of school facilities, and (B) in developing plans for construction, due consideration will be given to excellence of architecture and design and to compliance with standards prescribed by the Secretary under section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 in order to ensure that facilities constructed with the use of Federal funds are accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities;
- (8) that the local educational agency has adopted effective procedures for acquiring and disseminating to teachers and administrators participating in each program significant information from educational research, demonstrations, and similar projects, and for adopting, where appropriate, promising educational practices developed through such projects; and
- (9) that none of the funds expended under any applicable program will be used to acquire equipment (including computer software) in any instance in which such acquisition results in a direct financial benefit to any organization representing the interests of the purchasing entity or its employees or any affiliate of such an organization.
 (c) A general application submitted under this section shall remain in effect for the duration of the program it covers. 6. Section 427 of the General Education Provisions Act Assurances

Equal access will be provided to all students, teachers, and other program beneficiaries in Jefferson County. Opportunities will be given to all involved to participate in any project or activity while promoting high standards and providing the necessary resources. If a barrier is discovered, it will be immediately addressed by district staff and removed to ensure full participation in the program. (Examples: Language Barrier - addressed through translation services, quality programs, etc.

Technology Barrier - addressed through providing a device and/or internet capability & training will be provided for staff to most effectively deliver instruction.)
