The United States Department of Education (USED) has approved the application from the State of Alabama for ESSER funds under the CARES Act. The availability of funds is from 4/29/2020 to 4/29/2021. LEAs will be allowed to expend funds until 9/30/2022. Pre-award costs to the ESSER fund will be allowed for allowable cost incurred on or after March 13, 2020.

The LEA will use ESSER funds for activities allowable under section 18003(d) of Division B of the CARES Act. The United States Department of Education **does not** consider the following to be an allowable use of ESSER funds, under any part of 18003: 1) subsidizing or offsetting executive salaries and benefits of individuals who are not employees of the SEA or LEAs or 2) expenditures related to state or local teacher or faculty unions or associations.

How will the LEA determine the most important educational needs as a result of COVID-19?

The LEA will consider CDC, Department of Public Health, and the Alabama State Department of Education recommendations to provide a safe environment for students and staff returning to Jasper City Schools. The LEA will use input from educators and administrators to ensure students have the tools they need to learn both in school and remotely. We propose hiring 2 part-time Interventionists (one for T. R. Simmons Elementary and one for Maddox Intermediate), a system social worker, three part-time remote learner coordinators, and one full-time remote coordinator. To assist with COVID-19 response and mitigation services at school, we will hire 3 full-time healthcare aides. Additionally, we will purchase technology software infrastructure for tighter cyber security and safety as more devices will be going home. We will purchase software to support a-learning and remote learning, so that students can access books at home and be provided a pathway for instructional learning. WiFi will be purchased for all buses as well as personal hotspots. We plan to host after school tutoring program four days a week, to assist in closing the achievement gap for at-risk students. Sanitizing machines and chemicals, Infrared cameras, thermometers, cleaning and sanitizing products. Stipends will be used for teachers to create new pacing guides to correspond with new textbook courses of study.

How does the LEA intend to assess and address student learning gaps resulting from the disruption in educational services?

The LEA will use formative assessments and data meetings to identify gaps resulting from the disruption in instructional services. Once learning gaps are identified, staff will develop lessons targeted to meet student needs. We will begin assessing students during the first 2 weeks of school to determine skill and knowledge base.

What is the LEA's proposed timeline for providing services and assistance to students and staff?

The LEA will provide services and assistance to students and staff beginning in July 2020 and will continue through September 30, 2022 school year.

How will the LEA use ESSER funds to promote remote learning?

The LEA has a 1:1 student/teacher device currently in place. We will be providing additional cyber security since we anticipate we will continue to have times of being out of school. While our internal network system is secure, we want to make sure we have more security measures in place with infrastructure/networking. We also want to provide additional software that will allow students more access to books and learning pathways at home. Since we already have the hardware in place, we want to increase infrastructure security and learning software. Additional cables and wiring will be needed to run additional programs.

We have one private school in our area with 11 students. We have met with the administrator of the school to determine what their greatest needs are. They want to be included in our professional development programs and assistance with mental health resources and services. All services will be provided prior to September 30, 2022,

 - (7) that in the case of any project involving construction -
 - (A) the project is not inconsistent with overall State plans for the construction of school facilities, and
 - (B) in developing plans for construction, due consideration will be given to excellence of architecture and design and to compliance with standards prescribed by the Secretary under section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 in order to ensure that facilities constructed with the use of Federal funds are accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities;

6.: Section 427 of the General Education Provisions Act Assurances.

(a) The purpose of this section is to assist the Department in implementing the Department's mission to ensure equal access to education and to promote educational excellence throughout the Nation, by-

(d) Nothing in this section shall be construed to alter in any way the rights or responsibilities established under the laws cited in section 400(d) of this Act.




