PROGRAMMATIC, FISCAL, AND REPORTING ASSURANCES

The United States Department of Education (USED) has approved the application from the State of Alabama for ESSER funds under the CARES Act. The availability of funds is from 4/29/2020 to 4/29/2021. LEAs will be allowed to expend funds until 9/30/2022. Pre-award costs to the ESSER fund will be allowed for allowable cost incurred on or after March 13, 2020.

How will the LEA determine the most important educational needs as a result of COVID-19?

District leadership team addressed issues that have occurred due to COVID-19 and addressed activities that would support the students, teachers, and families of Cullman County Schools moving forward with COVID-19. District leadership team analyzed the data of families not having internet access, data from principals reporting the need of cleaning supplies, more thermometers, mask for faculties and possibly students. CSFO served on the leadership team reporting expenses that were used due to COVID-19. Surveys from parents and principals indicated the need for access to WIFI in rural areas and more devices for students. Reports from principals indicated the need to support the summer learning camps due to COVID-19 restrictions. See attached.

How does the LEA intend to assess and address student learning gaps resulting from the disruption in educational services?

Cullman County Schools are offering both virtual and paper packets of work to all students. We are looking at purchasing more devices and offering WIFI on buses to be parked in rural areas. Summer school/ summer camps are taking place and students have the choice of virtual or paper copies. Summer learning camp for 1st graders that were not proficient will be given the option of remediating through virtual or paper packets. Lessons have been created in subject areas with the focus on critical standards determined by the state, the new math course of study and important standards that spiral throughout the curriculum. District coaches are working with teachers to review using the instructional guides from the previous year to identify learning gaps.

What is the LEA's proposed timeline for providing services and assistance to students and staff?

4/29/2020-9/30/2022 purchasing technology, providing sanitation, and supporting learning
June -July Summer School/Summer Learning Camps
June-July Deep Cleaning with machines and continue when school starts.
July- purchasing more devices and WIFI on the go (buses in rural areas if needed)
June-July purchasing extra thermometers, mask, sanitizers, dividers, etc.. due to COVID-19 restrictions.
Aug- May purchasing resources to support the needs of individual schools

How will the LEA use ESSER funds to promote remote learning?

Funds will promote remote learning with purchasing more devices, WIFI for rural areas, license for online instruction with technology such as Edmentum, and using technology for videoing teachers teaching in the classroom to be used for students that cannot attend school. Funds will be used to support families in interacting between students and the classroom instructors. Funds will be used to support low-income students and students with disabilities such as assistive technology or adaptive equipment.

3. Equitable Services Assurances

The LEA Superintendent or his/her authorized representative assures or certifies the following:

(4) that the local educational agency will make reports to the State agency or board and to the Secretary as may reasonably be necessary to enable the State agency or board and the Secretary to perform their duties and that the local educational agency will maintain such records, including the records required under section 443, and provide access to those records, as the State agency or board or the Secretary deem necessary to perform their duties;

(5) that the local educational agency will provide reasonable opportunities for the participation by teachers, parents, and other interested agencies, organizations, and individuals in the planning for and operation of each program;

(6) that any application, evaluation, periodic program plan or report relating to each program will be made readily available to parents and other members of the general public;

(7) that in the case of any project involving construction -

(A) the project is not inconsistent with overall State plans for the construction of school facilities, and

(B) in developing plans for construction, due consideration will be given to excellence of architecture and design and to compliance with standards prescribed by the Secretary under section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 in order to ensure that facilities constructed with the use of Federal funds are accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities;

(8) that the local educational agency has adopted effective procedures for acquiring and disseminating to teachers and administrators participating in each program significant information from educational research, demonstrations, and similar projects, and for adopting, where appropriate, promising educational practices developed through such projects; and

(9) that none of the funds expended under any applicable program will be used to acquire equipment (including computer software) in any instance in which such acquisition results in a direct financial benefit to any organization representing the interests of the purchasing entity or its employees or any affiliate of such an organization.

(c) A general application submitted under this section shall remain in effect for the duration of the program it covers. The State agencies or boards administering the programs covered by the application shall not require the submission or amendment of such application unless required by changes in Federal or State law or by other significant change in the circumstances affecting an assurance in such application.

6. Section 427 of the General Education Provisions Act Assurances

- (a) The purpose of this section is to assist the Department in implementing the Department's mission to ensure equal access to education and to promote educational excellence throughout the Nation, by -
 - (1) ensuring equal opportunities to participate for all eligible students, teachers, and other program beneficiaries in any project or activity carried out under an applicable program; and
 - (2) promoting the ability of such students, teachers, and beneficiaries to meet high standards.

- (c) The Secretary may establish criteria and provide technical assistance for meeting the requirements of this section.
- (d) Nothing in this section shall be construed to alter in any way the rights or responsibilities established under the laws cited in section 400(d) of this Act.

What steps does the LEA propose to take to permit students, teachers, and other program beneficiaries to overcome barriers (including barriers based on gender, race, color, national origin, disability, and age) that impede equal access to, or participation in, the program?

Surveys will be conducted along with communication from the district, the schools, the classroom teachers to parents to identify any barriers. Cullman County Schools will accommodate any student that may have a barrier to participating in education during COVID19. Parents will have the option of traditional, blended, or online instruction for students due to COVID-19.


