PROGRAMMATIC, FISCAL, AND REPORTING ASSURANCES

Florence City Schools (FCS) will use spring student assessment data to determine gaps in student learning and provide instructional supports to address learning gaps. FCS conducted surveys during the Covid-19 closure addressing students learning and stakeholder educational needs. Survey data will address stakeholder concerns. FCS will consider all health regulations and precautions as we prepare to keep students safe while learning during the pandemic. We

FCS utilizies online diagnotic testing to monitor student learning and conducts local benchmark assessments. The results of the diagnostics and benchmark assessments will provide educators with academic levels of each student and learning pathways will be created to address gaps in student learning created by the Covid-19 closure. The district will provide supplemental learning opportunities during non-school hours and targeted instruction during school to address gaps. to

What is the LEA's proposed timeline for providing services and assistance to students and staff?

Based on the availability of funds, FCS will provide services and assistance to our students and staff beginning August 2020 and continue that assistance and support through September 30, 2022. All services and assistance will include any equitable services provided to private schools in the FCS district boundary.

How will the LEA use ESSER funds to promote remote learning?

FCS will use funding to purchase educational technology that aides in regular and substantive educational interaction between students and their teachers. Educational technology and training will be provided in order to meet all students' learning needs.

3. Equitable Services Assurances

(S) that the local educational agency will provide reasonable opportunities for the participation by teachers, parents, and other interested agencies, organizations, and individuals in the planning for and operation of each program;

(6) that any application, evaluation, periodic program plan or report relating to each program will be made readily available to parents and other members of the general public;

(7) that In the case of any project involving construction -

(A) the project is not inconsistent with overall State plans for the construction of school facilities, and

(B) in developing plans for construction, due consideration will be given to excellence of architecture and design and to compliance with standards prescribed by the Secretary under section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 in order to ensure that facilities constructed with the use of Federal funds are accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities;

(8) that the local educational agency has adopted effective procedures for acquiring and disseminating to teachers and administrators participating in each program significant information from educational research, demonstrations, and similar projects, and for adopting, where appropriate, promising educational practices developed through such projects; and

(9) that none of the funds expended under any applicable program will be used to acquire equipment (including computer software) in any instance in which such acquisition results in a direct financial benefit to any organization representing the interests of the purchasing entity or its employees or any affiliate of such an organization.
(c) A general application submitted under this section shall remain in effect for the duration of the program it covers. The State agencies or boards administering the programs covered by the application shall not require the submission or amendment of such application unless required by changes in Federal or State law or by other significant change in the circumstances affecting an assurance in such application.

6. Section 427 of the General Education Provisions Act Assurances

CARES I Amendment February 2022

There have been no changes to the services provided through the CARES funding, Florence City Schools is amending budget line items to support the needed increase or decrease in funding needs to support a particular service.

In order to combat learning loss incurred by the COVID shut down, Florence City Schools employed additional teachers and increased instructional hours for virtual and in-person learning to combat the effects on learning caused by COVID 19. The increase in teacher support both virtually and for in-person learning required an increase in the budget line value for salaries and benefits. The staff increase provided intervention to support small group instruction for improved instructional delivery and student academic achievement toward state standards, while not interrupting scheduled general classroom instruction.

Due to the lingering effects of COVID Florence City would also need an increase in the PPE budget line to support needed masks, isolation barriers, gloves, gowns, and other items to support personal protection to combat the effects of COVID 19.

Areas not fully expended were the areas dealing with supplies, technology to include computer hardware and software, instructional supplies, Health Services, and janitorial supplies. These lines will be amended to show the expended values.
