PROGRAMMATIC, FISCAL, AND REPORTING ASSURANCES

The superintendent, administrative staff, and principals will meet to discuss the most Important educational needs of the district. The goal will be to identify immediate needs the district will have during COVID-19 and rank the needs based upon the greatest Impact. Services will be purchased and implemented in the order of greatest need. The following are identified as the most important educational needs: Technology, Instructional software, Instructional materials, Cleaning Supplies, Distant Learning, Tutoring, Summer Intervention and Summer Enrichment,

How does the LEA Intend to assess and address student learning gaps resulting from the disruption in educational services?

Lowndes County Public Schools will offer summer Intervention and enrichment programs to address students learning gaps. The district will utilize Winter 2019 -2020 assessment data as a benchmark to measure students progress. Students participating in summer programs will take pre/post assessments utilizing Edgenuity and Performance Series platforms. The district will conduct Performance Series Fall, Winter, and Spring assessments during the 2020 -2021 school term to monitor progress.

Lowndes County Public School's proposed timeline of implementation: March 2020 -September 2022

How will the LEA use ESSER funds to promote remote learning?

Lowndes County Public Schools will utilize ESSER funds to provide intervention services, extended day activities, computer hardware, instructional software, remote Internet access, distant learning equipment and training for staff on effectively utilizing remote learning.

The private school will utilize equitable service funds to prepare for remote instruction. Timely and meaningful consultation will occur through Zoom meetings. The proposed Time line for services and assistance to be implemented by the private school is March 2020 through September 2022.

- (5) that the local educational agency will provide reasonable opportunities for the participation by teachers, parents, and other interested agencies, organizations, and individuals in the planning for and operation of each program;
- (6) that any application, evaluation, periodic program plan or report relating to each program will be made readily available to parents and other members of the general public;
 - (7) that in the case of any project involving construction -
 - (A) the project is not inconsistent with overall State plans for the construction of school facilities, and
 - (B) in developing plans for construction, due consideration will be given to excellence of architecture and design and to compliance with standards prescribed by the Secretary under section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 in order to ensure that facilities constructed with the use of Federal funds are accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities;
- (8) that the local educational agency has adopted effective procedures for acquiring and disseminating to teachers and administrators participating in each program significant information from educational research, demonstrations, and similar projects, and for adopting, where appropriate, promising educational practices developed through such projects; and
- (9) that none of the funds expended under any applicable program will be used to acquire equipment (including computer software) in any instance in which such acquisition results in a direct financial benefit to any organization representing the interests of the purchasing entity or its employees or any affiliate of such an organization.
- (c) A general application submitted under this section shall remain in effect for the duration of the program it covers. The State agencies or boards administering the programs covered by the application shall not require the submission or amendment of such application unless required by changes in Federal or State law or by other significant change in the circumstances affecting an assurance in such application.

6. Section 427 of the General Education Provisions Act Assurances

- (a) The purpose of this section is to assist the Department in implementing the Department's mission to ensure equal access to education and to promote educational excellence throughout the Nation, by -
