Graduation requirements for this period of time were written in vague terms and the local systems had a lot of flexability in course offerings.
Grade nine was considered by some systems as part of junior high school and not high school. For that reason, some systems did not award Carnegie Units in Grade 9, but awarded coursecredits
Carnegie Units were earned based on time requirements. It was recommended that core courses have 2 to $21 / 2$ hours time in Grades $9-10$ and Grades 11-12 have $11 / 2$ to 2 hours.
It is suggested that in many cases a desirable pupil load may consist of the core curriculum having a credit value of two units, plus one elective having a credit value of one unit, plus physical education, which has a credit value of from $1 / 4$ to $1 / 2$ unit, plus music, or art, or other special interest activities having a credit value of from $1 / 2$ to $3 / 4$ unit.

| 1854-1858 | William F. Perry was the first state superintendent |

| 1908 | First effort to present a course of study to all of the county systems. |
| 1910 | A 250-page document, State Manual of the Course of Study for the Public Elementary Schools of Alabama, was published by the state for Grades 1-7. |
| 1913 | 1910 manual was revised and published as the second edition. |
| 1915 | Further revisions were made and the third edition was published. |
| 1918 | A 14-page booklet, Course of Study for the Elementary Schools of Alabama. With Suggestionsfor Grading. was given to all Alabama teachers. |
| 1919 | The School Code of 1919 made provision for a State Board of Education, State Department of Education (Staff of 4), and the changing of the organization of the schools from a 7-4 plan to a 6-3-3 plan. |
| 1921 | A new 176-page Course of Study for Elementary Schools was published. |
| 1924 | 1921 manual was revised and printed. White schools were open for an average of 133 days. Negro schools were open for an average of 112 days. |
| 1926 | A third printing of the revised 1921 manual was necessary. |
| 1927 | School Code contained a provision for a state committee on courses of study for elementary and high schools. This was the first effort to approach curriculum development on a state-wide, organized basis. |
| 1929 | First full-time Executive Secretary of the Course of Study Committee was selected by the State Board. |
| 1930 | A 900-page volume of Course of Study for Elementary Schools was published by the state committee with cooperative efforts of some 5000 teachers under the direction of the Executive Secretary. It received national recognition and acclaim. |
| 1931 | The Alabama High School Music Festival Association held it first annual festival - All-State Chorus, an All-State Orchestra, and two All-State Bands. |
| 1932-1933 | Over 50,000 white children or approximately 21 per cent of the children in the white rural schools of Alabama had school terms of three months and less; over 129,000 white children or approximately 55 per cent of the children in the white rural schools of Alabama had school terms of $51 / 2$ months or less; and over 48,000 regular students did not even enroll in school. |
| 1935 | Minimum Programs Acts were enacted into law for the 67 county boards and 45 city boards in Alabama. School programs varied around the state; some elementary schools operated 7 months and high schools operated 9 months. Initiation of the state-wide Alabama Curriculum Devlopment Program. |
| 1935-1937 | Report of State Superintendent reports: $\approx 58 \%$ of students continue to high school, school attendance above Grade 8 is voluntary; the percentage of negro children enrolled to the total enrollment of negroes and whites varied from .2 of 1 per cent in one county to 87 percent in another county. |

1938 Upon suggestion and approval of the State Steering Committee of the Alabama Curriculum Development Program, the Elementary School Curriculum Committee was appointed by the Director of the Division of Instruction with the State Supervisor of Elementary Education as chairman. The task of the committee was to prepare a teacher's guide or curriculum materials for the elementary schools of Alabama.

1940 The legal State Committee on Courses of Study was appointed by the State Board of Education to make recommendations for the textbook committee, and to set up in broad outline the course of study for the twelve-year school program in Alabama. State Teachers' Retirement System was enacted.

1941 A496-page document, Course of Study and Teacher's Guide for the Elementary Schools, Grade 1-6 , was published. A 282-pages document, Program of Studies and Guide to the Curriculum for Secondary Schools, was published. Because the war broke out in 1941, the planned professional devleop of the documents was not realized.

1942 A 36-page document, 1942 Supplement to the State Course of Study for Elementary and Secondary Schools, was published. It contains suggestions to the schools on organization for wartime activities, and for meeting special wartime needs in mathematics, science, health and safety, social studies, and conservation. Alabama Legislature mandated 140 minimum school days for Alabama students; national average-174.5.
1937-1942 Report of the State Superintendent was published. "It is not necessary to be reminded that for the past ten years schools have been seriously affected by the depression, by unemployment, by confusion and uncertainty, by the threat of impending war, and also by the strenuous activity which followed the actual beginning of was. High schools have been most profoundly affected by these situations. However, in spite of the short school terms, lowered salaries, reduced number of teachers, lack of desirable equipment and materials, and other handicaps, there has been a substantial growth in the enrollment of the schools and improvement in the distribution of this enrollment."
" ... The war emergency sharply focuses attention on the necessity for developing strong, vigorous, and courageous youth and adults with bodily efficiency, skill, sentiment, and the spirit to perform well daily task with enough reserve to meet necessary emergency demands. Tens pf thoousands of draft registrants have been rejected because of physical, mental, or emotional defects. Those who have been accepted have been required to take several months of training to harden them physically. These facts disclose deplorable conditions in the physical fitness of our people. These conditions make it necessary for schools to become vital centers for developing fitness--physical, mental, and emotional-for in-school and out-of-school individuals."

1943 White schools were open for an average of 168 days. Negro schools were open for an average of 166 days.

Public Education in Alabama, A report of the Alabama Educational Survey Commission. The State Department includes 4 major divisions: Administration and Finance, Instruction, Vocational Education, and Negro Education.

In accordance with statutory requirements a new committee on courses of study was appointed.

1950 A unified course of study, Course of Study and Guide For Teachers Grades 1-12, was published.

1954 Alabama COURSE of STUDY Grades 1-12 was published. Legislature gave approval to Act No. 80 which provided the law governing the formation of the Course of Study Committee. Brown vs Board of Education decision to desegregate schools; Alabama had laws that required elementary schools be segregation

1963 First black students enroll in previously all-white public Alabama schools
1964 Alabama COURSE of STUDY Grades 7-12 was published. Established required subjects and elective subjects by course, number of minimum minutes per week per course, and unit value per course.
