PROGRAMMATIC, FISCAL, AND REPORTING ASSURANCES

The United States Department of Education (USED) has approved the application from the State of Alabama for ESSER funds under the CARES Act. The availability of funds is from 4/29/2020 to 4/29/2021. LEAs will be allowed to expend funds until 9/30/2022. Pre-award costs to the ESSER fund will be allowed for allowable cost incurred on or after March 13, 2020.

2. Allowable Service(s) Assurance

How will the LEA determine the most important educational needs as a result of COVID-19?

MPS conducted several needs assessments and surveys to determine what tools/services are needed for students to work remotely from home or face-to-face in the midst of the pandemic. The needs assessment and surveys spanned over each division (technology, curriculum and instruction, student services, human resources, operations, and CNP). Parent surveys were also conducted to determine internet access, device availability and preference for attending school in the traditional face-to-face format or remotely.

How does the LEA intend to assess and address student learning gaps resulting from the disruption in educational services?

In order to counter any learning gaps as a result of the disruption of services at the end of the 2019-2020 academic year, MPS provided extended learning opportunities for students following the initial COVID release. As needed, students had the opportunity to continue instructional paths with assigned teachers through June 15, 2020. Additionally, identified students were provided an opportunity to participate in summer school at the secondary level and summer enrichment opportunities were provided district-wide K-12.

Based on feedbeck from parents and guidance from the State Department of Education, MPS will utilize the following methods to ascertain current student levels of performance: Scalation Performance Series for core content reres (ELA Meth. Science, Social Studies) in grades 212 and Renaissance STAR Early Literacy and Early Math in grades K3.

MPS will provide Reading and Math Programs (RAMP) support in all Title I achools beginning fell 2020 to provide supplemental support for students. Students who are attending school via a rentiale learning platform will have access to these supports by participating in RAMP breakout sessions in Schoology.

What is the LEA's proposed timeline for providing services and assistance to students and staff?

MPS began hosting specialized training in June 2020 to support teachers with the expectation of providing instructional support in a virtual/remote platform. Based on teacher and administrator feedback, additional sessions will be provided beginning August 2020.

Beginning August 2020, web postings will be uploaded to the district website to support students and parents with virtuel/remote expectations.

How will the LEA use ESSER funds to promote remote learning?

MPS will use ESSER funds to promote remote learning by providing Myfi devices and bus internet hubs for families that need support with accessing the internet. The district is expanding technology access for students by acquiring devices to support implementing a 1:1 initiative. Devices will be provided for teachers and administrators to support monitoring remote learning expectations. The district is investing in a protection plan to support all stakeholders when a device malfunctions.

Private schools will utilize 2019-20 CARES Act ESSER service funds to impact both student achievement in their respective teaching and learning environments based on various needs assessment data. CARES Act ESSER service funds will assist private school entities in building capacities and teveraging resources/services to address COVID-19 challenges in providing; necessary instructional materials to improve classroom instruction, purchasing essential supplies/equipment (to sanitize and clean facilities), as well as purchasing educational technologies to address long-term closure needs and/or virtual learning needs. As the local LEA, MPS engages perticipating private schools in timely and meaningful initial and ongoing consultations in leveraging resources and services to combat COVID-19 impact through a systemic process. The LEA notifies private schools via letters, phone calls, and/or emails to identify which schools are interested in participating. 4. Other Assurances and Certifications

- (8) that the local educational agency has adopted effective procedures for acquiring and disseminating to teachers and administrators participating in each program significant information from educational research, demonstrations, and similar projects, and for adopting, where appropriate, promising educational practices developed through such projects; and
- (9) that none of the funds expended under any applicable program will be used to acquire equipment (including computer software) in any instance in which such acquisition results in a direct financial benefit to any organization representing the interests of the purchasing entity or its employees or any affiliate of such an organization.
- (c) A general application submitted under this section shall remain in effect for the duration of the program it covers. The State agencies or boards administering the programs covered by the application shall not require the submission or amendment of such application unless required by changes in Federal or State law or by other significant change in the circumstances affecting an assurance in such application.

6. Section 427 of the General Education Provisions Act Assurances

- (a) The purpose of this section is to assist the Department in implementing the Department's mission to ensure equal access to education and to promote educational excellence throughout the Nation, by -
- (1) ensuring equal opportunities to participate for all eligible students, teachers, and other program beneficiaries in any project or activity carried out under an applicable program; and
 - (2) promoting the ability of such students, teachers, and beneficiaries to meet high standards.

- (d) Nothing in this section shall be construed to alter in any way the rights or responsibilities established under the laws cited in section 400(d) of this Act.

MPS plans to provide training for students, teachers and families on the use of the devices and Schoology. Training videos will be developed and uploaded so that stakeholders will have availability as needed. As appropriate, individualized plans will be developed and implemented with students (and teachers) to ensure equal access to programs and supports.

Montgomery Public Schools (MPS) will utilize 2019-20 CARES Act ESSER service funds to impact both student achievement in their respective teaching and learning environments based on various needs assessment data. CARES Act ESSER service funds will assist all of our schools, along with participating private schools in building capacities and leveraging resources/services to address COVID-19 challenges. This will include providing: necessary instructional materials/equipment to improve classroom instruction, purchasing essential supplies/equipment (to sanitize and clean facilities), adequately build technological/operational staffing capacities to readily meet all demands related to COVID-19, as well as purchasing educational technologies and infrastructure to address long-term closure needs and/or virtual learning needs. If any barrier arises, MPS will quickly resolve the issue so that the educational process will continue. MPS will also expend or encumber all ESSER funds by September 30, 2022.

Currently, MPS does not have security guards at any of its thirty-two (32) elementary schools to assist school administration with the social distancing of students and parents. These is a tremendous need when working with younger students. Additionally, the security guards provide assistance to the food service department (CNP) during curbside pickup of breakfast and lunch. These guards will also assist if any school(s) is required to close down or evacuate due to COVID-19. If MPS is not able to hire enough security guards, we will contract for security services.

As the local LEA, MPS engages participating private schools in timely and meaningful initial and ongoing consultations in leveraging resources and services to combat COVID-19 impact through a systemic process. The LEA notifies private schools via letters, phone calls, and/or emails to identify which schools are interested in participating. Upon Identifying interested schools, Initial and ongoing consultations occur to: identify specific school needs, purchase resources, and implement and monitor the effectiveness of services. The first consultation with private schools related to ESSER funding was held on June 29, 2020. In light of the respective private schools start dates, services/assistance will be implemented during August 2020. Additional private school consultation began on November 3, 2020 to adjust for changes in the calculation method. All private school funds will be expended or encumbered by September 30, 2022.
