PROGRAMMATIC, FISCAL, AND REPORTING ASSURANCES

The United States Department of Education (USED) has approved the application from the State of Alabama for ESSER funds under the CARES Act. The availability of funds is from 4/29/2020 to 4/29/2021. LEAs will be allowed to expend funds until 9/30/2022. Pre-award costs to the ESSER fund will be allowed for allowable cost incurred on or after March 13, 2020.

2. Allowable Service(s) Assurance

How will the LEA determine the most important educational needs as a result of COVID-19?

Bibb County Schools conducted a "Needs Assessment" meeting (6/17/2020) to collect and examine information about school related issues that should be addressed, as a result of COVID-19. Parent surveys have also been administered to gain feedback from parents and guardians. School and district personnel are currently using the feedback data to create a plan to improve student outcomes and provide sanitary school facilities. Critical needs have been identified and are being addressed using research based programs, various technology devices for students and teachers, and items to sanitize and clean facilities.

How does the LEA intend to assess and address student learning gaps resulting from the disruption in educational services?

Assessments such as AIMSweb Plus/Pearson, iXL, Beacon and Scantron Achievement Series will be used to assess student learning gaps. Research based programs will be used to address students varied individual learning needs. Technology will be used to supplement instruction and will increase motivation, student engagement and accelerate student learning. After school programs, using 21st Century funds and Title I funds will also be used to assist in addressing student needs.

How will the LEA use ESSER funds to promote remote learning?

One-to-One Technology devices for students and teachers will be purchased with a large portion of the ESSER funds. Technology supports both teaching and learning in the classroom and creates opportunities for the many diverse learning styles. Should the schools experience additional shut-down time, the devices will be used to allow students to continue receiving instruction and earning credits outside of the traditional school setting. In addition, internet access is being evaluated for student households. Internet access is now available in all school parking lots. Free Wifi options throughout the district will be identified for student use in the absence of internet service at home.

3. Equitable Services Assurances

The LEA Superintendent or his/her authorized representative assures or certifies the following:

- The LEA receiving ESSER funds will provide equitable services to students and teachers in non-public schools as required under Section 18005 of Division B of the CARES Act.

Timely and meaningful consultation with Cahawba Christian began shortly after notification of grant funds (6/15/20). A Needs Assessment meeting was held with Cahawba personnel on 6/29/20. The following needs were identified by committee members: daily building sanitation, quarterly disinfecting services and tutoring services. Sanitation, disinfecting services and tutoring services will begin 8/2020.

The LEA Superintendent or his/her authorized representative assures or certifies the following:

 - (5) that the local educational agency will provide reasonable opportunities for the participation by teachers, parents, and other interested agencies, organizations, and individuals in the planning for and operation of each program;
 - (6) that any application, evaluation, periodic program plan or report relating to each program will be made readily available to parents and other members of the general public;
 - (7) that in the case of any project involving construction -
 - (A) the project is not inconsistent with overall State plans for the construction of school facilities, and
 - (B) in developing plans for construction, due consideration will be given to excellence of architecture and design and to compliance with standards prescribed by the Secretary under section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 in order to ensure that facilities constructed with the use of Federal funds are accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities;
 - (8) that the local educational agency has adopted effective procedures for acquiring and disseminating to teachers and administrators participating in each program significant information from educational research, demonstrations, and similar projects, and for adopting, where appropriate, promising educational practices developed through such projects; and
 - (9) that none of the funds expended under any applicable program will be used to acquire equipment (including computer software) in any instance in which such acquisition results in a direct financial benefit to any organization representing the interests of the purchasing entity or its employees or any affiliate of such an organization.
- (c) A general application submitted under this section shall remain in effect for the duration of the program it covers. The State agencies or boards administering the programs covered by the application shall not require the submission or amendment of such application unless required by changes in Federal or State law or by other significant change in the circumstances affecting an assurance in such application.

6. Section 427 of the General Education Provisions Act Assurances

(a) The purpose of this section is to assist the Department in implementing the Department's mission to ensure equal access to education and to promote educational excellence throughout the Nation, by -

(1) ensuring equal opportunities to participate for all eligible students, teachers, and other program beneficiaries in any project or activity carried out under an applicable program; and

(d) Nothing in this section shall be construed to alter in any way the rights or responsibilities established under the laws cited in section 400(d) of this Act.

What steps does the LEA propose to take to permit students, teachers, and other program beneficiaries to overcome barriers (including barriers based on gender, race, color, national origin, disability, and age) that impede equal access to, or participation in, the program?

Based on district data collected, each student enrolled in Bibb County Schools will have a technology device issued, without regard to race, gender, color, national origin, disability, or age. These devices will be using the classroom as well as the home setting. In addition, an equal number of custodial and sanitation items will be provided for each school campus, as well as transportation and maintenance departments and Bibb County Board. All students will have equal opportunity to be protected by the sanitary custodial purchases.
