How will the LEA determine the most important educational needs as a result of COVID-197

Legacy Prep used student, parent, and teacher feedback from the March 2020 school closure to determine the highest needs of support for the 2020-2021 school year that will offer face-to-face and virtual learning options. This feedback, along with academic achievement data, will assist Legacy Prep to identify and determine the most important educational needs for the current school year so that a high quality educational experience can be offered to all students during this pandemic time of learning. We determined our needs are for an instructional Coach and Learning Specialist.

How does the LEA intend to assess and address student learning gaps resulting from the disruption in educational services?

Legacy Prep intends to assess and address student learning gaps by providing targeted diagnostics. We have and will continue to assess individual instructional gaps. The data has informed our ability to provide targeted remediation to scholars who need it. Our extended school day of over 7.5 instructional hours allows for robust targeted interventions. We have purchased research-based Tier1 -Tier III math and reading curriculum to supplement and extend learning. Our scholars continue to receive on grade level academic standards to ensure the gap does not widen while also receiving targeted support.

What is the LEA's proposed timeline for providing services and assistance to students and staff?

August 2020 - September 20, 2022

How will the LEA use ESSER funds to promote remote learning?

The ESSER funds will be used to pay salaries and benefits for our instructional Coach and Learning Specialist. The support provided by our instruction Coach and Learning Specialist has aided in the success of our remote learning program. Our Learning Specialist taught a cohort of 17 3rd grade students, provides remote tutoring, administers assessments, and provides targeted small group leasons. Our instructional Coach directly supports 6 teachers and 79 students. Her coaching is targeted towards improving teacher practice in service of moving the academic needle for kids. Our instructional Coach also administers assessments given to remote learners and analyzes the assessment data to determine invidual student needs.

 (B) in developing plans for construction, due consideration will be given to excellence of architecture and design and to compliance with standards prescribed by the Secretary under section 504 of the

Rehabilitation Act of 1973 in order to ensure that facilities constructed with the use of Federal funds are accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities;

What steps does the LEA propose to take to permit students, teachers, and other program beneficiaries to overcome barriers (including barriers based on gender, race, color, national origin, disability, and age) that impede equal access to, or participation in, the program?

Each year Legacy Prep has an open-enroliment window in which the school will accept applications for the coming school year. By default, the open enrollment pollcy ensures there are no barriers that impede equal access to or participation in our programming. If the number of applications received exceede the number of aveilable seats at a grade level, a lottery will be used to determine the placement of students at that grade level. All applicants are randomly assigned a number which is then drawn randomly during the lottery. Should there be more lottery applications than available seats, students are randomly assigned waitlist numbers. Legacy Prep does not carry its waitlist from year to year. Waitlist numbers are cleared and students are bumped up one grade level for the lottery the following year. Should any barriers arise for any stakeholders, they will be addressed immediately.
