RE: State At-Risk Funds Allocated for Fiscal Year (FY) 2022

The FY 2022 State At-Risk funds have been allocated to the Alabama State Department of Education (ALSDE) and will be distributed to local education agencies (LEAs) for at-risk programs, alternative education programs, school safety enhancement programs, and programs to prevent students from dropping out of school. Please see Attachment A for your allocation.

The LEA may receive FY 2022 funds by submitting plan components and budget pages as found in the attached State At-Risk Application document and by completing an evaluation of FY 2021 programs (Attachment B). At-risk program funds will not be disbursed until the LEA has a complete FY 2022 State At-Risk on file at the ALSDE.
