3 Relating to education; to establish the State Seal 4 of Biliteracy;; to recognize graduattes who have demonstratted an 5 indicated level of profictionary in English and at least one other world language, including American Sign Language. 6 7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA: 8 Section 1. (Ca)) The State Department of Education 9 shall develop and award a State Seal of Biliterary to those 10 highschool students who have demonstrated an indicated level 11 of proficiency in English and at least one other world 12 language, including American Sign Language. School district 13 participation in the program is voluntary.

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14 (b) The purposes of the State Seal of Biliterarcy are 15 as follows:

16 (II)) To encourage students to study languages.
17 ((2)) To certify attainment of biliteracy.
18 ((3)) To provide employees with a method of
19 identifying people proficient in language and biliteracy
20 skills.

21 (24)) To provide institutions of higher education with 22 a method to recognize and give academic credit to applicants \tilde{E}_3^7 seeking admission.

24 (55)) To prepare students with 21st Century skills.

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1 (5)) To recognize and promotte world language 2 instruction in public schools. 3 (C77)) To strengthen intergroup relationships, affirm the value of diversity, and honor the multiple cultures and 4 5 languages of a community. 6 Section 2. The State Seal of Biliterary certifies 7 attainment of an intermediate level of proficiency by a 8 graduating student in English and at least one other world 9 language, and certifies that the graduatte meets all of the 10 following criteria: i11 (II)) Completiion of the graduatiion requirements of the 12 high school. 13 ((2)) English language proficiency: The student shall 14 demonstrate proficiency in the English language, through one 15 of the following approaches, or as provided by any future 16 equivalent national normed benchmark approved as part of the 177 program: 18 a. ACT English: A score of 18 or higher. ii 9 b. ACT reading: A score of 20 or higher. 20 c. Advanced Placement Language Examination: A score of three or higher. 21 22 d. International Baccalaureate Examination: A score È3, of five or higher.

1 e. WIDA ACCESS 2.0: For non-natiwe English speakers, 2 the student shall meet and maintain Alabama exit criteria in 3 EnFonderish prooficiency. 4 f. The school district shall certify to the State 16 17 Superintendent of Education that a school district language examination meets the rigor at the intermediate midd level of 18 19 language proficiency according to the guideliness of the 20 American Council of Teachens of Foreign Languages. To that 21 end, the assessment of a language other than English shall 22 assess listening, speaking, reading, and writing at a level of ŻБ intermediate-mid proficiency or higher. The assessment should 24 be similar to the American Council of Teachers of Foreign 25 Languages Oral Proficiency Interview Writing Proficiency Test

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and should require collaborattion with community members who
 are native speakers or near native speakers in that language.
 This assessment should be similar to the process used in other
 states for assessing profficiently in tribal languages.

2. Notwittinstanddigg subparagraph 1., a student who
seeks to qualify for the State Seal of Bilittenany through a
language that is not characterized by listening, speaking,
reading, and writing, or for which there is no written system,
shall pass an assessment on the modallitties that characterize
communication in that language at the corresponding
intermediate profictient level or higher.

c. If neither paragraph a. nor paragraph b. are able
to be implemented, or if new language assessments become
available, one of the following approaches may be followed:

15 I. The State Superintendent of Education may provide
16 a listing of equivalent language assessments that school
17 districts may use.

2. A school district may provide the State
Superintendent of Education with a list of equivalent language
assessments that the school district proposes to use in place
of those listed in this section. The State Superintendent of
Education may use lists received from school districts in
developing a state list of equivalent language assessments.
Section 3. The State Department of Education shall

25 do both of the following:

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1 (1)) Prepare and deliver to participatting school 2 districts an appropriate insignia to be affixed to the diploma 3 or transcript of the student indicating that the student has 41 been awarded a State Seal of Biliterary by the State 5 Department of Education.

6 ((2)) Provide other informatiion the department deems 7 necessary for school distriction to successfully participate in 8 the program.

9 Section 4. A school district that participatiess in
10 the program under this act shall do both of the following:

(II) Maintain appropriate records in order to
 identify students who have earned a State Seal of Biliterary.

13 ((2)) Affix the appropriate insignia to the diploma
14 and transcript of each student who earns a State Seal of
15 Biliteracy.

Section 5. It is the intent of the Legislatture that
no fee be charged to a student to participate in the State
Seal of Biliteracy pursuant to this act.

Section 6. This act shall become effective on the
first day of the third month following its passage and
approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
