- **WHEREAS**, dyslexia impacts approximately one out of five children in Alabama schools; and
- WHEREAS, through effective dyslexia screening, students with dyslexia can be identified as early as kindergarten, long before their learning challenges have resulted in learning disabilities; and
- **WHEREAS**, early identification and intervention will equip many students with dyslexia for success in school and in life; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Alabama State Board of Education has specifically addressed dyslexia within the *Alabama Administrative Code*; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Alabama State Board of Education has committed itself to supporting Alabama schools and teachers with resources, materials, and professional development; and

ADOPT NEW ALABAMA ADMINISTRATIVE CODE RULE 290-2-1-.06, PERTAINING TO ANNUAL APPORTIONMENT OF RAISE ACT FUNDS

EXECUTIVE (INCLUDES LEGAL AND PUBLIC INFORMATION)

Dr. Mackey reminded the audience that three local education agencies are currently under state Several times a year, we provide the Board Members with public updates highlighting positive developments within those school systems. The Bessemer City School System began the academic year with Mr. Michael D. Turner serving as its new superintendent. Mr. Turner replaced the previous superintendent who departed for a job in Texas. Dr. Mackey reported that construction projects within the Bessemer City School System are progressing steadily toward completion. In 2024, following the Alabama State Department of Education's intervention in the Bessemer City School System, we collaborated to develop a comprehensive strategic plan and have been working diligently to implement it. Over the past five months, the Bessemer City School System Board Members have completed intensive boardmanship training Dr. Mackey said much thanks to Alabama and prescriptive professional development. Association of School Boards. Implementing the new payroll system is essential, as it addresses one of the initial challenges identified within the Bessemer City School System. The Bessemer City School System has had a strong start to the school year, with things progressing well since opening.

Dr. Mackey stated that the Dallas County School System is the latest district to undergo state intervention, with our involvement beginning just a few months ago. During that period, the school system experienced the departure of both its Chief School Financial Officer and its Superintendent. Dr. Mackey reported that the Dallas County School System has Mr. Brent Mims as its new Chief School Financial Officer and Dr. Corey Jones, who began his tenure as Superintendent on October 1, 2025. Dr. Mackey stated that two schools had to close due to a decline in enrollment. He said they are working on a long-term plan for financial responsibility and accountability in the Dallas County School System.

Dr. Mackey reported that the Sumter County School System has been in state intervention the longest. Dr. Mackey stated that a very strong construction project is ongoing in the Sumter County School System. He said they had to close two schools and are in the process of consolidating to one campus in Sumter County. The Board Members of the Sumter County School System have also taken part in leadership training. Dr. Mackey stated that they are working through the Cognia accreditation report. Some of you may recall that the Sumter County School System received an unfavorable accreditation report, and the Department is actively working to address the identified deficiencies. Dr. Mackey noted that as part of each state intervention, the Department engages the accreditation agency to conduct a thorough review and identify areas of deficiency. He stated that the Department will address and resolve the identified deficiencies before returning control of the school system to the local voters and taxpayers.

STATE SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Dr. Mackey gave a thank you to all the honorees and representatives in the audience. Recognitions and initiatives covered were principals, assistant principals, History Teacher of the Year, National Civics Teacher of the Year, School Counseling Programs of Distinction, initiatives in dyslexia and manufacturing, statewide parent engagement efforts, the Alabama College Application Campaign, and Alabama School Bus Safety. Dr. Mackey asked all school counselors to stand and remain standing because he has some others to join them. He noted that we will get a first look at a new school counseling plan that has not been updated since 2003. It has been 22 years. The work has been ongoing this year to update this plan. Dr. Mackey gave a big thank you to Mrs. Kelly Mooney for her willingness to join the counseling committee. Dr. Mackey stated that the committee was chaired by Dr. Lewis Brooks, Superintendent of the Shelby County School System, but he was unable to attend due to a family situation. Dr. Mackey asked all the principals and assistant principals who were recognized this morning to join the counselors in standing. He acknowledged that two honorees were unable to be in attendance today. Dr. Farrell Seymore, Executive Director of the Council for Leaders in Alabama Schools (CLAS), and Mrs. Whitney Miller-Nichols, CLAS Director of Governmental Relations, have worked hard to bring this group together. This year, principals and assistant principals across schools were honored for their contributions. Dr. Mackey expressed his gratitude to both individuals for their collaboration with the Department throughout the process.

Dr. Mackey acknowledged Mrs. Malinda Nichols, Alabama's 2025 History Teacher of the Year, and Ms. Veronica Pitts, the 2025-2026 National Civics Teacher of the Year. He thanked them both for investing in the students every day. Dr. Mackey stated that this is why October's meeting is a celebratory one. He acknowledged that while the educators are spending a day away from their students, each of them interacts with hundreds of children daily and makes a meaningful difference in their lives through their dedication and investment. Dr. Mackey expressed his appreciation for the vital contributions the honorees make each day.

Dr. Mackey reminded everyone that the Board Members conducted significant business this morning, including approving rule changes that reflect the major shift brought about by the *RAISE Act*. Dr. Mackey emphasized that this represents the most significant change in school funding in three decades. The Alabama Legislature enacted the law, Governor Kay Ivey signed it earlier this year, and now the Board Members have implemented the rule. Dr. Mackey stated that the remaining items included approving the annual apportionment of Foundation Program funds for the current year, as well as the appropriation request for the upcoming year. He emphasized that those three actions are a major milestone, representing over five billion dollars annually in school funding—yet much of the work happens behind the scenes. Dr. Mackey thanked Governor Ivey and the Board Members for their vote today, for their confidence in the budget plans and requests, and for the dedicated work that brought us to this moment. He said they look forward to presenting those items to the Legislature in the coming weeks.

Dr. Mackey recognized all the representatives of dyslexia awareness in attendance—staff members, teachers, Certified Academic Language Therapists (CALTs), and others—who were dressed in red, and invited them to stand in honor of the important work they do to support students with dyslexia. Dr. Mackey affirmed that this is meaningful work making a real difference. Dr. Mackey noted that Alabama is gaining national recognition for its substantial investment in students. Alabama currently faces a significant shortage of CALTs. Dr. Mackey indicated that this is an initiative the Department will continue to promote, encouraging individuals to pursue that pathway and providing a substantial stipend upon completion. Dr. Mackey invited all the honorees to remain for portraits after the meeting.

There being no other business before the Board, on motion by Dr. Wayne Reynolds and seconded by Dr. Yvette Richardson, Board Members voted unanimously to adjourn the meeting at 10:27 a.m. The next Alabama State Board of Education Meeting for Elementary and Secondary Education will be held on Thursday, November 13, 2025, at 10 a.m. in the Auditorium of the Gordon Persons Building followed by the Work Session.
